Cabinet To Hear Request For Aid

The request by the East Prince Fishermen's Association for government assistance for the fishermen of District No. 8, due to the present unusually poor lobster season will be one of the items introduced by Fisheries Minister Leo F. Rossiter at the meeting today of the provincial cabinet.

A brief from the association, requesting that District Eight be named a disaster area was received by Mr. Rossiter last week.

Mr. Rossiter said he was very sympathetic to the fishermen's plight and intimated he might ask for assistance on a sharing basis between the federal and provincial governments.

Asked if assistance of this kind would be setting a precedent, Mr. Rossiter said, "no" that in the early 1950's a federal-provincial sharing scheme was worked out to assist fisherman when they suffered a heavy trap loss through bad weather.

The brief stated that 324 fisherman had suffered serious loss of income because of an unprecedented drop in lobster production and they feel this warrants assistance from federal and/or provincial sources.

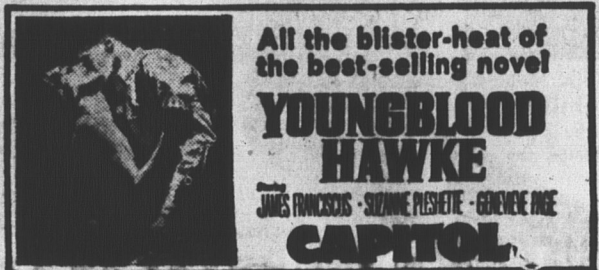

Increased Loan Fund Hailed By J. Mullally

Referring to the recent announcement by Prime Minister Pearson that the provinces could exceed their allotments for assistance under the Canada Student Loan Plan, Kings County Liberal candidate John Mullally said he had urged the federal treasury to allot more money to this province.

reason is the Island has the largest number of students per population of any of the Atlantic provinces.

It is expected when Parliament resumes following the election, a new arrangement regarding the students loans will come up in the House of Commons.

"As soon as I learned that the Island allocation of \$248,000 had been exhausted," Mr. Mullally said today, "I got in touch with Finance Minister Gordon and urged him to take up the matter of increasing our allotment. When I was in Ottawa last week, I made further representations, pointing out that our Island loan applications had risen to past \$400,000."

This means, said Mr. Mullally, that all eligible students on the Island will now receive their loans in full.

"It means, he said, "that any young Canadian who has the ability, the qualifications and the ambition to acquire a university education can be assured of financial aid up to a maximum of \$1,999 per year."

469 BORROWED

Last year 469 Prince Edward Island students borrowed a total of \$283,000 to help finance their education. Total participation for all Canada was 42,500 students who were loaned \$25,400,000. "Prince Edward Island is the only province where the demand for loans this year has exceeded the allotment" said the Liberal candidate. "We have a fine tradition for scholarship on the Island and it is good to see that more and more of our young people are pursuing their ambition for higher education which leads to better citizenship."

Applications for loans by Island university students under the loan plan almost doubled the \$248,000 allotted to this province, it was announced by Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education.

Word was received by Mr. MacKenzie from Ottawa that applications for loans were to be made regardless of the allotment. The amount exceeding the original allotment would be charged against next year's amount.

RECEIVED HALF

Island students applying for loans have received half the amount requested and the rest to follow early in the new year, except for those who sought small amounts in which case the full amount was paid.

Mr. MacKenzie said yesterday one of the reasons why the number of applications was so high in this province is because many of the university students from the Island come from low income families, such as farmers and fishermen. Another

Month Begins With Soaking

A total of 1.30 inches of rain fell on Charlottetown in the first three days of October it was learned yesterday.

In the entire month of September only 1.11 inches of rain fell. The driest September on record was in 1950 when only 1.05 inches of rain fell.

From five o'clock Sunday night until eight o'clock yesterday morning .42 inches of rain was recorded.

In Summerside .42 inches of rain fell during the night with winds gusting from 22 mph to 30.

All across the Maritimes, the story was the same, more rain in the first two days in October than in all of September. The first nine months of the year were the driest since records have been kept.

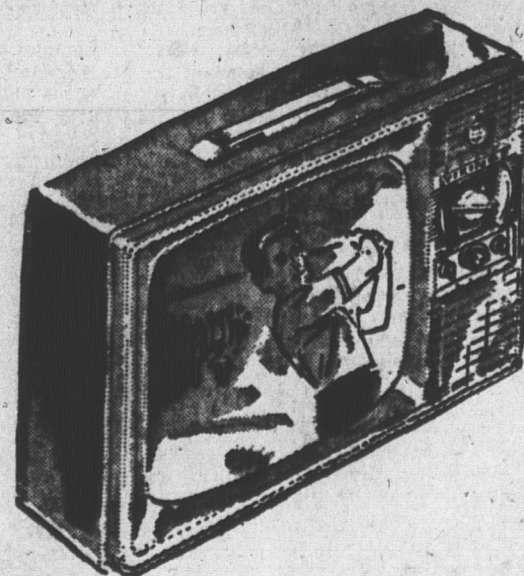
