**Les Grand Ballets Canadien To Be Presented Here Friday**

An evening of ballet will be presented Friday at 8:30 p.m. in Queen Charlotte High School auditorium by Les Grand Ballets Canadien.

A program consisting of light and comic ballet, as well as some more serious numbers designed to provide entertainment which will be found most enjoyable.

Among the numbers to be presented will be the famed ballet "Graduation Ball" by Jean Struss Jr., Comedia Dell'Arte a number of traditional and comic farces in the style of the 18th and 19th centuries which is a perennial favorite of light ballet lovers.

The more serious followers of the ballet will appreciate the two numbers by Tchaikovsky included in the program, "Lakme" and "Premiere Classe".

There will be about 30 dancers appearing in the ballet under the artistic direction of Mme. Ludmilla Chiriacoff, ballet master Dan Seller and the musical direction of Claude Porier.

**Premier Shaw Sees Budget Of No Great Help To Province**

Commenting on Finance Minister Gordon's budget, delivered in the House of Commons Monday night, Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday he could not see "any great encouragement as far as this province is concerned."

"It's a stand pat budget," said the premier, "and it contains no relief from taxation."

"I had expected some change in the tax on construction materials but that remains as is and it is a rather serious impediment in the way of normal construction processes involving our farming, fishing and urban citizens."

"There is no relief on income or other taxes and there is no very great assurance that the deficit at the federal level is going to be reduced."

Premier Shaw said it is apparent that the federal government will carry on for a further period its policy of granting concessions to new industry in designated areas. "We have been completely disregarded in this policy," he said, "ever since the designated areas were named and there is no evidence at the

moment that we are to receive any further attention in this respect."

"For this reason we will not enjoy the concessions that are available to a number of areas within a stone's throw of this province even though our economic conditions in parts of the province are just as serious as in those nearby localities."

**Report Heavy Ice In Gulf**

R. Graham Rogers, transportation director, yesterday heralded the fact that despite heavy ice being reported in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, some open water near the mouth of the St. Lawrence River, was a "good sign."

The ice is said to stretch about two-thirds across the Cabot Strait between Sydney and Port Aux Basques.

There was a little open water reported in the Georgetown and Sours areas, but heavy packed ice beyond.

Loose ice clogged the Northumberland Strait, but no difficulty was experienced by the CNR ferry "Abetweil" on her early crossings yesterday.

**Former Cornwall Brothers Die**

Mr. and Mrs. Claude Craswell, Wexford, have received word of the death of two brothers, former Island men, who died recently in Strabourg, Saskatchewan, within two days of each other and were buried following a common funeral service.

Dan Craswell was born in Cornwall, P.E.I., June 20, 1873 and his brother, Pope, April 8, 1899. They died within two days of each other.

Dan left P.E.I. as an Edward Island land in 1905 and settled in the United States, but went to Strabourg in 1918 and farmed actively until 1944. He lived with his brother Pope on his farm until 1958 when they both moved to town. He is survived by one brother Albert who resides in Prince
