Minister Will Form New Quebec Cabinet

By RICHARD DAIGNAULT Canadian Press Staff Writer QUEBEC (CP) — Lieutenant-Governor Onesime Gagnon will call upon youth and welfare minister Paul Sauve 32, to form a cabinet by this week.

The premier's death leaves the cabinet without a chairman. However all matters continue to be handled by the provincial ministers until a new premier is chosen to form a cabinet of his own.

Mr. Sauve, their apparent to Mr. Duplessis for several years, arrived in Quebec City earlier Sunday.

No major changes in portfolios are expected to take place in the immediate future.

Mr. Sauve said early Monday, after learning of the premier's death, that the ministers would meet later in the day to discuss funeral arrangements.

It is expected Mr. Duplessis will be in state in the red and gold legislative council — provincial Upper House — and that the funeral will take place in the Quebec basilica.

Miss Dorothy Sinclair who heads the group said Sunday night that with the aid of the provincial department certain families were picked at random throughout the province to assist in the survey.

Those selected are in the older age group, 70 years and over. If those picked are willing to participate they will be asked to keep a detailed four-day record of the various foods consumed.

All are asked to continue with their normal diet and not to undergo any changes in their eating habits. From these records the department hopes to obtain valuable information from which they will be able to give advice to older aged persons and to help them to maintain a better healthful condition through nutrition during later years of life.

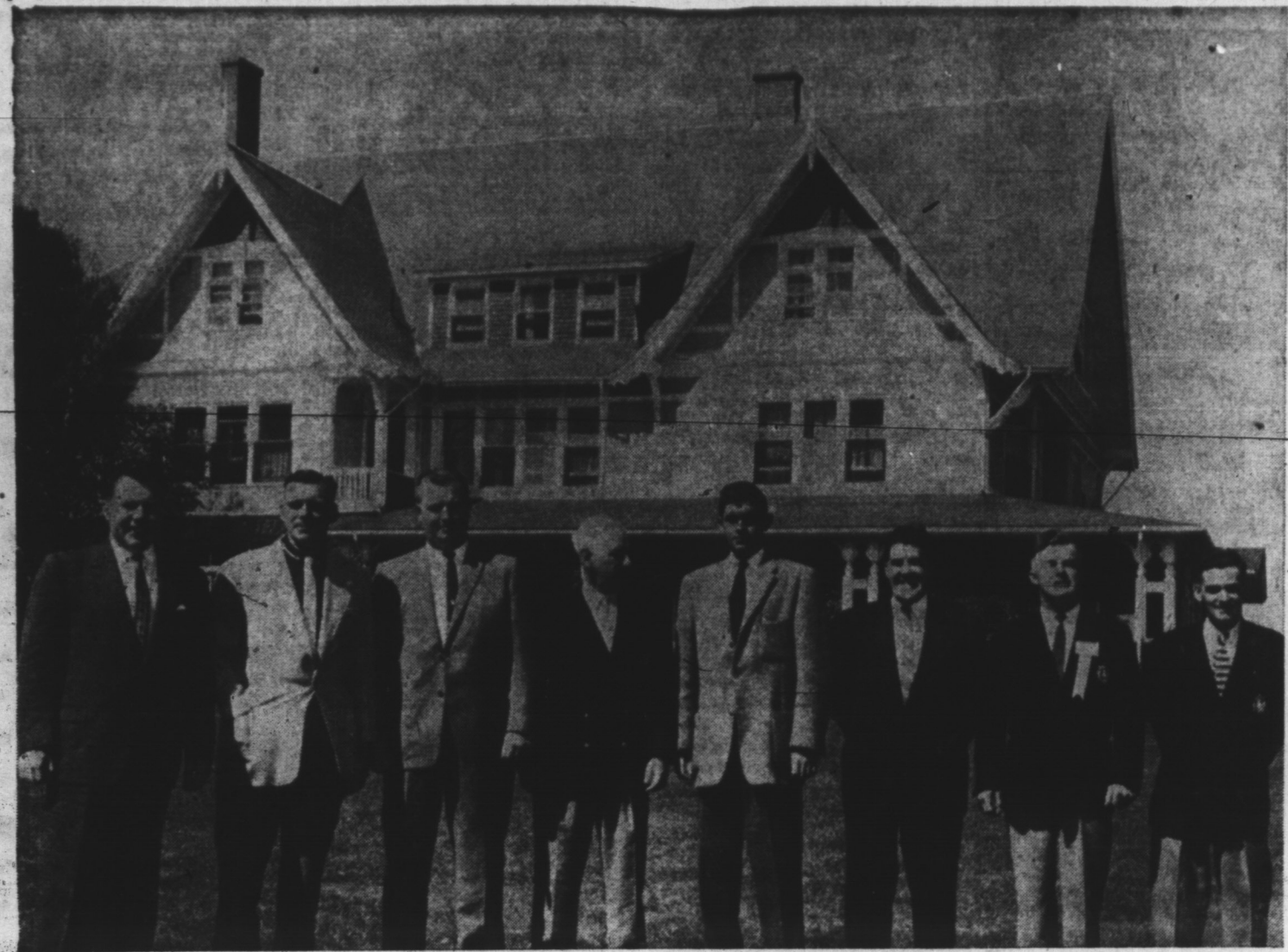

BALTIMORE (AP) — An outbreak of racial tension turned an "All Nations Day" celebration into a mob scene at a nearby amusement park Sunday. Pickets protesting the exclusion of Negroes from privately operated Gwynn Oak Park were set upon by an angry crowd shouting "Get a rope! . . . Knock them over the head! . . . Back to Russia!" They were among 40 protesting members from the Committee on Racial Equality a bi-racial group which has picketed the last five annual "All Nations Day" observances at the park.

11 Arrested In St. Louis

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Eleven Negroes, part of a crowd which roughed up a police officer, were arrested Sunday in the latest of a series of such incidents here. Patrolman James Meegan, a white officer, was on his way home after going off duty when a Negro man stopped him and began protesting the recent arrest of his son.
