POLIO IMMUNIZATION Clinics conducted by the Health Department will be held in most of the rural schools during the next three weeks, or in regional centres. These are for first and second polio inoculations for children born before 1955 up to pupils in Grade X, also for expectant mothers. These latter must present a doctor's certificate confirming pregnancy when reporting for a first inoculation. Teachers will have information about dates and times of clinics. A re-inoculation for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus will be given for infants and vaccination against smallpox. ANNOUNCES INCREASE - An increase in the price of certain brands of wines and spirits sold in the Government Vendors Stores throughout the Province was announced Wednesday by the Temperance Commission in Charlottetown. The new prices which went into effect yesterday morning amount to an increase of about 10 per cent in the price of both Canadian and imported wines. In the case of Canadian Scotch whiskeys the increase amounts to 25 cents per bottle while imported Scotch remains unchanged. SHIPS IN PORT - The S.S. Magdalen, from the Magdalen Islands, took on her regular semi-monthly cargo at the Buntain and Bell wharf yesterday. She sailed late in the day for her home port. The S.S. Sauril, which has been tied up at the Marine Wharf for the past few days, sails this morning. After picking up some cargo, the Sauril will continue on her voyage to the Cape Breton center via Dead Man's Island in the Magdalen. After placing the light in operation there, she will go to Sydney. United Church Plans New City Suburbs Congregation The P.E.I. United Church Presbytery has approved the establishment of a new congregation in the suburbs of Charlottetown. Dr. A.S. Weir, in opening the matter of a possible new congregation in the Parkdale-Belvedere area, also noted that the official board of Trinity Church Charlottetown has given its approval to the idea of having a new congregation in this area. Presbytery agreed to appoint a committee to work with Trinity congregation in the carrying out of the plans for the formation of this new congregation. Addresses by Dr. H.L. Pottle, Secretary of the Board of Information and Stewardship, and Rev. Floyd Honey, associate secretary of the Board of Overseas Missions, highlighted the meetings of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, the United Church of Canada, held yesterday in the Trinity United Church, Summerside. Dr. Pottle, speaking at the noon hour, outlined some of the tasks facing the newly formed Board of Information and Stewardship. There is a real danger, he said, that the spiritual leadership of the Western World may decline in our generation. At the same time he continued, Canada is itself one of the most fertile fields for Missionary advance, and its role in missionary leadership out to be vital. Dr. Pottle was, before coming to the secretaryship of the Board of Information and Stewardship, a member of the Newfoundland Cabinet, from the time of the Union, in 1949, until April of 1955. He served in the Cabinet as Minister of Public Welfare, and was very active in Church work in his own congregation. He is at present visiting various Presbyteries of the United Church in the Maritimes. Mr. Honey, addressing the court in a moving and compelling way, noted that in spite of the ousting

of Western missionaries from China, the work of the church goes on, and men and women are still offering themselves to the work of the Christian ministry. Many of the external forces working against the Christian faith were outlined, notably the effects of Communism and the non-Christian religions of the world. Coming closer to home, Mr. Honey stated that about 50 per cent of Canada would constitute the field for Christian evangelism in our own nation. Mr. Honey is a returned missionary, having served for a number of years in China. The report of the committee on colleges and students showed that two men have recently offered themselves for the work of the ministry of the church. These are Wesley William Adams of Bideford, and Ian MacLean of Charlottetown. Mr. MacLean is a son of the Rev. Frank MacLean, Trinity Church, Charlottetown. Presbytery was informed of the extensive plans now underway for the holding of a mission in Summerside from November 10 - 25. Rev. R.W. Armstrong, Ottawa, is to be the missionary. The services are to be held in the Civic Auditorium, and plans are underway to bring in the members and adherents from all the surrounding congregations. Sessions for the day were under the chairmanship of Rev. S. H. Haslam, Margate. Opening devotions were conducted by Rev. Farquhar MacKinnon, Valleyfield.

What Excuse Is Sermon Theme "What excuse" was the theme of a thought-provoking and inspirational message given by Dr. Hugh F. Sensibaugh at Central Christian Church last night. Beginning with the well-known parable in Luke's gospel, the speaker noted that people still persist in excusing themselves from God's invitation. Three important points were emphasized: it is a privilege to be a Christian; this invitation is open to all people; if necessary, the invitation divides people into two classes who accept and those who reject. 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Island Breeders Score In Guernseys And Holsteins AMHERST, N.S. (Special) - Harold Palmer and sons from Kensington made an excellent showing in a very strong class of Guernseys at the Maritime Winter Fair on Thursday when all but the milk cows and senior herd groups were judged. In the first eight classes of Junior male and female entries, the Palmer herd took six of the first place ribbons. It also took a first in the four-year-old dry class. The Palmers had second place in the Junior yearling heifer, the two-year-old dry and junior get of sire, as well as the junior reserve female championship. Another Kensington farmer, Alton Bell, took the Junior male reserve championship. His junior yearling bull was first in his class. Kier Jones of Harrington took first in the senior yearling heifer class. Well up in the money in other classes were Owen Younker and Son, Kingston, Allison Carr of Harrington and Ernest F. Coles and Sons of Milton. Judging of the milk cows and senior groups will take place Friday.

HOLSTEINS "Abegweit Commonwealth," herd sire from Falconwood Farm took reserve grand championship in a very large exhibit of Holsteins. Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture was on hand to see the animal take second from top honours. Many Islanders have attended the fair during the week. Max Thompson of Victoria took first for senior yearling bull, "Romandal Reecho Sovereign" to go on to the reserve junior championship. This young sire has been a winner of the all-Canadian award and was junior champion at the Provincial Exhibition in 1956. Mr. Thompson has been offered an attractive price for the animal which will likely be sold before the end of the fair. In the junior heifer class, the Victoria breeder took second prize. Bunbury farms took first for senior heifer calf, and had several other strong placings as did S.C. Stewart and Sons of Dunstaffnage, and Oswald Newson and Son, Clyde River. Judging of Holsteins will continue on Friday.

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
