farm households in Prince Edward Island conducted by her department and suggested its use as a basis for teaching nutrition and food preparation.

"Canada's Food Rules" were discussed in detail on Friday afternoon by Dr. L. B. Pett, Chief of the Nutrition Division, Department of National Health and Welfare. Dr. Pett pointed out that Canada's Food Rules are a useful guide in encouraging food habits which will result in improved nutrition for Canadians. The home economists present viewed with enthusiasm a new film "Food for Freddie" prepared by Dr. Pett's Department, and the National Film Board.

Other sessions dealing with current problems in home economics included a Panel Discussion on "Careers and Recruitment" led by Dr. Juanita H. Archibald, Nutritionist with the Nova Scotia Department of Health, on Friday morning, and on Saturday morning, special interest groups dealing with "Extension Services" led by Dr. Helen Abell, "Foods" led by Sister St. Alexander, "Institution Management" by Patricia M. Giovannetti, "Public Health Nutrition" by Dr. L. B. Pett, "School Curriculum" by Miss Mary L. Morley, and "Textiles" by Miss Elizabeth Magee of Acadia University.

The Home Economists were welcomed to Amherst by the Mayor. Greetings and reports were brought from the Canadian Home Economics Association by Miss Doris M. Anderson, Supervisor of Home Economics Education for Prince Edward Island, and from the Canadian Dietetic Association by Miss Doris Runciman, Miss Ruth Binnie, Supervisor of Home Economics Education for Nova Scotia gave a report of the International Congress of Home Economics held during the past summer in Edinburgh. Student home economics club members from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia colleges attended special sessions of their own in addition to many of the regular meetings.

Miss Elizabeth MacMillan was chairman of the conference, with Miss Doris M. Anderson as representative of the Prince Edward Home Economics Association acting as a member of the Program Committee. Approximately 200 delegates from different parts of the Maritimes attended the Conference with ten members from Prince Edward Island being present.

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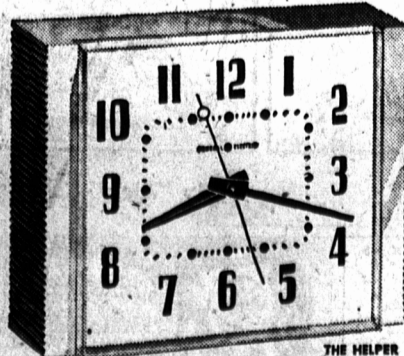
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
