THE SESSION BEGINS TO DAY

Opening Ceremonies same as Usual.

FULL TEXT OF THE SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

Guard of Honor and a Salute From Fort Edward

The Provincial Legislature met for the despatch of business this afternoon at four o'clock. The opening ceremonies were of the usual character, and the speech with which His Honor Lieutenant Governor Howland opened the session was as follows:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It gives me much pleasure to again meet you as representatives of the people of this Province in Parliament assembled.

Notwithstanding that the harvest of the past year was not as bountiful as anticipated, yet a kind Providence has bestowed peace and abundant prosperity upon our people.

During the past year as you are aware, Her Majesty was pleased to appoint the Earl of Minto Governor General of Canada. It is a source of gratification that a gentleman knowing the wants and having the interests of this fair Dominion so much at heart has been sent to rule over us.

The increased interest manifested in Agriculture and Horticulture, combined with the success of our Dairymen, must be a cause of great satisfaction to all concerned and should call forth special legislation for the further encouragement of our farming population. During recess, through the courtesy of the Minister of Agriculture, this Province was favoured with a visit from Professors Robertson and Macoun of Ottawa. These gentlemen addressed several meetings in the three counties, and the large attendance indicates that the farmers are alive to the importance of their honorable calling. The information afforded by these addresses must contribute in a decided manner to the advantage of our people. In this connection, a measure will be submitted for your approval having for its object the appointment of a Dairy Inspector for Prince Edward Island.

In view of the proposed action of the Dominion Government to span the Hillsborough River with a Railway bridge, you will be called upon to participate in its construction in order that our people may have the double advantage of a railway and a general traffic bridge combined, thus doing away with our antiquated ferry system, its many attendant evils and expense. A bill providing for this most important undertaking will be laid before you.

The decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, recently delivered, brings this Province within measurable distance of the realization of some of its long-ago claims against the Federal Government. Measures are therefore being prepared which I trust will place this Province on a more substantial financial basis, and forever settle this much vexed question which has for years been perplexing both the Federal and Local Governments. You will also be gratified to learn that this decision of the Privy Council has revealed the fact that the Provincial Legislatures are the proprietors of the fore-shores, bays and rivers of the several provinces, and that the Dominion has a legislative jurisdiction only. That the beds of all ungranted waters situated within the territorial limits of a Province are the property of such Province and not of the Dominion. It therefore becomes essential that legislation defining the respective rights and interests of the parties involved should be carefully considered by the Federal and Local Governments, on the lines laid down by the Privy Council, with a view of reconciling existing differences. Anticipating such legislation, my Government in conjunction with the Governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, sent a delegation to Ottawa early in January of this year to confer with the Minister of Marine and Fisheries on this vital matter, a report of which, with a bill in accordance therewith will be laid before you.

Measures having for their object the construction of permanent public works, and an improved Road Act will be brought under your consideration.

The Public Accounts and the reports of the various departments of the public service will be submitted to you, and the estimates for the current year will be presented for your approval.

I feel sure that you will give your best attention to the subjects mentioned, as well as to such other matters as may appear to you to be for the public good.

The guard of honor on the occasion was under command of Major Crockett, of No. 4 Company, Little York.

The Alaska-Yukon Boundary Line

SUBMITTED TO THE IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT FOR APPROVAL.

A Vote to be Taken on To-morrow Night.

OTTAWA, April 17.—It is understood that the government has decided to accept as the provisional boundary line between the Yukon and Alaska on condition that the United States Government agree to an immediate adjudication of the boundary question.

The proposition has been sent to the Imperial Government for approval.

The debate on the address has far exceeded in length any such previous debate. It is believed that the vote will be taken on Tuesday night on Britton's sub-amendment and discussion of the main motion will continue a couple of days longer.

TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE

There was a large attendance at the annual meeting of the Charlottetown Temperance Alliance held in the Y. M. C. A. hall on Saturday evening, and much interest was taken in the proceedings. The President went over the work of the year and recounted the part taken by the Alliance in the plebiscite campaign. He urged upon the members the necessity of doing something to secure an improved condition of affairs in Charlottetown so far as the traffic in intoxicants is concerned.

The treasurer's report showed an expenditure of \$217.91, mostly in connection with the plebiscite campaign. The receipts amounted to like sum.

The liquor situation in Charlottetown was discussed, and some amendments to the Liquor Regulation Act were considered. A committee of three was appointed to draft amendments. The officers for the ensuing year are as follows:

CHEESE MARKET.

Price 2c Ahead of Last Year and an Excellent Outlook.

Next to the boom in cattle one of the most striking features in the market situation is found in the exceeding firmness of cheese. Prices at the present time are fully 2 cents above the quotation for last year at this date, and even at present prices the indications are the market will be stripped bare before the new make commences to come in, two months hence. Notwithstanding the high price there is little danger of any considerable quantity being made before the regular season, the firmness in butter being sufficient to induce dairymen to confine their operations to the production of creamery for the present.—The Canadian Cheese and Butter Maker.

THANKSGIVING FOR THE POPE'S HEALTH

A Grand Ceremony at St. Peters

ON THE OCCASION OF THE MASS OF THANKSGIVING.

The Pope Carried in the Procession of Cardinals.

ROME, April 17.—The Thanksgiving Mass at St. Peter's Cathedral, which was postponed on account of the illness of His Holiness from the anniversary of the coronation, was celebrated yesterday in the Basilica.

The Pope entered by an interior staircase communicating with the chapel of the Holy Sacrament.

He was preceded by a procession of cardinals and prelates in full vestments and wearing the triple crown.

He was carried along the great nave on the Sedia Gestatoria to the pontifical throne, the congregation raising loud acclamations until he took his seat. Cardinal Commillo Mazzetti, the Prefect of the Congregation of Sacred Rites, celebrated Mass.

At its close the Pope solemnly gave his blessing and was then borne back to his apartment amid renewed acclamations.

The Supreme Pontiff looked as well as he did before his illness.

Salvation Army.

The anniversary meetings at the Salvation Army yesterday, led by A. K. H. McGillivray and the resident officers, were very successful. The closing meeting will be held this evening for which a very entertaining programme has been prepared consisting of solos, duets, and selections from the band.

The Salvation Army has now been in operation in Charlottetown for thirteen years. During that time hundreds have professed conversion in the meetings. While some have not followed the Saviour all the way and others have united with the churches or have removed to other places yet there are about eighty enrolled soldiers in good standing and active fighters in the war. Fifteen soldiers have gone from the local corps as officers and are to-day engaged in carrying on the war in other fields of labour—one in England and Bermuda a few in the United States and others throughout the Dominion. The work at present is in a fairly flourishing condition, there being several recruits ready for enrollment and the Salvationists are determined to make their fourteenth year the best on record.
