

# Interest Said Growing In Economic Planning

Speaking to the Canadian Labor Congress staff seminar at Dalby-by-the-Sea, acting C.L.C. research director, Russell Bell said "the interest in the world has been so dependent on foreign capital for its internal development as Canada."

At the same time Mr. Bell said that if Canadian capital is to finance a larger proportion of the nation's investment requirements, "it would appear, however, that we must accept some form of economic planning."

He said, "More Canada is now being developed because of the need of more economic planning in the past two years than ever before."

He said more and more Canadians, "whether from a growing sense of nationalism or because of a vague uneasiness that Canadian sovereignty was being eroded," appeared to be showing an increasing aversion to the influx of American capital.

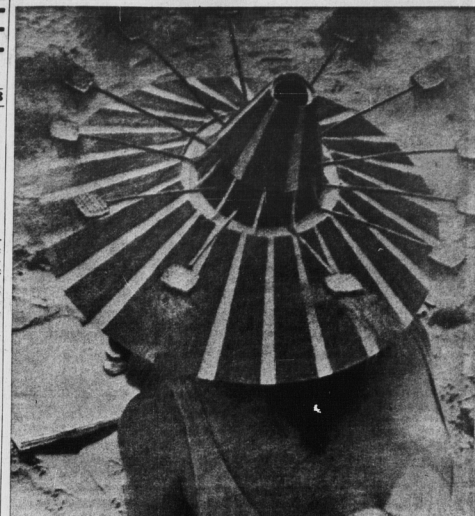
But he warned, "Until Canadians find alternative ways of financing their own investment requirements, they will be wise not to scare off American capital. This would only result in the further slowing down of a already slow rate of economic growth, with a consequent aggravation of the unemployment problem."

During the four-day seminar which concluded Tuesday, Philip B. Aitken, executive secretary of the New Brunswick Research and Productivity Council outlined the objectives of the organization.

He said the real purpose of the council is to make a contribution towards increasing the standard of living in the province.

"The problems of productivity in relation to labor are those of fair distribution of the rewards of increased productivity and of temporary unemployment due to improved methods."

Other speakers at the seminar included Rev. Vincent Murnaghan of the St. Dunstan's University's economic department.

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## CPR Gets Okay To Drop Trains In Northern N.B.

**TORONTO (CP)** — The CPR has been granted permission by the Board of Transport Commissioners to discontinue passenger trains 123 and 124 between McAdam and Edmundston, N.B.

Train 123 leaves McAdam every except Sundays at 8 a.m. and arrives at Edmundston at 1 p.m. Train 124 leaves Edmundston daily except Sundays at 3 p.m., arriving at McAdam at 8 p.m.

A judgment made public by the board said the board is satisfied that the railway, which has been operating since 1919, is not profitable.

The board's decision granting the railway authority to discontinue the two trains follows an earlier judgment rejecting a previous CPR application.

The judgment, signed by Assistant Chief Commissioner H. H. Griffin, said discontinue the two trains would result in a financial improvement to the railway of some \$11,900 annually.

"It is my considered opinion that the loss to the railway in maintaining the present service outweighs a 'inconvenience' that might accrue to shippers and receivers under the proposed highway express operation," Mr. Griffin said.

## Butter, Milk Powder Production Declines

**OTTAWA (CP)** — Production of butter and skim milk powder declined in August and the first eight months of the year compared with the same periods last year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported Friday.

Output of cheddar cheese, ice cream mix and evaporated whole milk showed increases in the two periods.

Creamery butter production in August dropped to 45,052,000 pounds from 45,009,000 in the same month a year ago. In the January-August period output decreased to 346,553,000 pounds from 352,736,000.

Production of skim milk powder dropped to 20,399,000 pounds in August from 20,009,000 in the eight months before. In a large city unit not necessarily be needed in a remote country district. However, tarpaper shacks would not qualify.

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Detroit Lions and Dallas Cowboys are favored to draw first blood tonight in games launching the National Football League on its 44th season.

Competing with the fading major league baseball races for the spectator dollar, the NFL serves up a seven-game weekend schedule expected to draw 317,000 fans.

The Lions, with quarterback Mill Plum directing their attack, are a two-touchdown choice over Los Angeles Rams at Los Angeles, while the Cowboys are rated seven points over crippled St. Louis Cardinals at Dallas.

Defending champion Green Bay Packers, without suspended Paul Hornung, and eastern titelholders New York Giants both swing into action Sunday afternoon. The Packers play Chicago Bears before a sellout crowd of 42,327 at Green Bay. The Giants go against Baltimore Colts, under coach Don Shula, before an expected 60,000 at Baltimore.
