### Credit Need Is Growing

OTTAWA — Canadian farmers' need for long term credit is growing at a tremendous rate, recent statistics show.

To the end of August this year, loans made under the Farm Credit Corporation have increased 31 per cent in number and 77 per cent in dollars over the same period of 1964.

Some 7,053 loans totalling \$129,415,400 have been approved compared to 5,258 loans totalling \$72,996,000 in 1964. Three provinces, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Ontario account for most of the total.

Saskatchewan leads with 2,080 loans, Alberta 1,979 and Ontario 1,267.

But farmers have been much slower to take advantage of the Farm Machinery Syndicate credit which was approved by parliament last year. Under this plan, three or more farmers can join together to borrow up to \$15,000 each for machinery which will be used co-operatively.

In the first eight months of operation, only 785 syndicates have been formed and they have obtained 93 loans totalling \$700,894.

Alberta leads with 39 loans for \$430,000 and Saskatchewan is second at 24 loans and \$110,264.

### Wheat Moving Exceeds Quota

**MONTREAL** — The movement of wheat to the Lakehead by Canadian National Railways has picked up to the point where the company is exceeding its daily quota set by the Canadian Wheat Board, N.J. MacMillan, CNS executive vice-president said last week.

Mr. MacMillan, who has just returned from a special inspection tour of Western Canada, said the daily target of 600 cars for CN has been surpassed by an average of about 100 cars per day.

The situation is also improving in Vancouver, he said, where there is an increase in the number of in-bound CN cars. Last week 1,584 cars were moved to Vancouver, compared to 1,088 in the previous week.

As of Oct. 27 there were some 10,907,000 bushels in Vancouver area elevators, compared to a low of 8,682,000 bushels on Aug. 16. On the same date the Lakehead elevators were stocked with more than 505,000 bushels, in comparison to their low of 39,760,000 bushels on Sept. 20. A record 24,707,000 bushels of wheat has been cleared through the northern port of Churchill, now closed for the winter, and CN has been commended by the Canadian Wheat Board for the role it played in this movement.

### New Uniform For Trainmen

**MONTREAL** — The dark blue uniform with its gold or silver buttons, long a symbol of dress for railway train crews is on the way out at Canadian National Railways.

It is being replaced by a stylish charcoal grey, single-breasted model with plain buttons for conductors and trainmen. The conductor will have two conspicuous gold bands on each sleeve to denote the highest level of command in train service, a broad gold band on his cap and a gold CN symbol on the jacket. The trainman will have a single silver band on each sleeve, a silver band on his cap and a silver CN symbol.

The new uniforms will start appearing on Oct. 31 with inauguration of CN's new "Rapido" between Toronto and Montreal. They are part of CN's usual redesign program and will be subject to modification if experience indicates changes are necessary.
