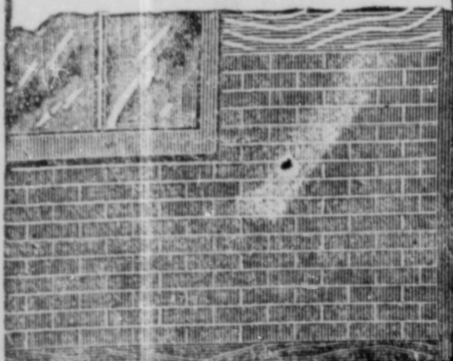

### OUR STREETS, SQUARES AND DRIVEWAY.

The repair of our streets has, necessarily, been somewhat neglected this year on account of the sewerage work. But we are pleased to note a decided and gratifying improvement in respect to our squares. Rochford Square and Hillsborough Square have been made pleasant to look upon; and Queen Square continues to be highly creditable to Charlottetown. Mr. Tate is to be congratulated upon the improvement resulting from the removal of the old fence and the nicely-trimmed borders. Though the flowers are not all—as we have recently seen—sufficiently costly to please every taste, it cannot be denied that the Queen Square Garden, as a whole, is skilfully maintained and worthy of the admiration bestowed upon it by strangers. The driveway on the waterside of Victoria Park, now almost completed, is an unique attraction in connection with our city. We do not think that there is anything equal to it or the landscape beauty it reveals upon this side of the Atlantic. If it should appear that the work done this year has not cost too much, the thanks of the citizens will be specially due the councillors who have carried it to completion. The park is becoming more and more a place of popular resort; and if the ugly high white fence dividing it from Government farm were replaced by a neat iron structure, there would be little or nothing to mar the quiet beauty of the spot or limit its attractiveness for all sorts and conditions of people. We are not without hope that an opportunity for its enlargement by the addition of the fields at the rear of Government House, may ere long occur.

### AN AWFUL CONFESSION OF RASCALITY.

The West Elgin election trial was concluded with a most deplorable acknowledgment of pre-conceived, organized, and scientifically accomplished wrong-doing on the part of the election agents of the Liberal Government. Mr. Macnish, the successful Liberal candidate, makes over his signature a clean breast of the whole thing. He says, in brief, as follows:—

"1. A large number of persons were specially sent into the constituency by men working on behalf of the Liberal party for the express purpose of taking part in the election on Macnish's behalf and fraudulent and corrupt means were used by some of such persons to carry the election.

"2. Several of such persons illegally acted as deputy returning officers, and in at least three cases acted in the names of reputable local men.

"3. In many of the polling sub-divisions there were 'grave irregularities' connected with the return of the ballot boxes and the counting of the ballot.

"4. There were large numbers of persons brought into the riding for the express purpose of personating legitimate voters, assistance by some of Mr. Macnish's local supporters, such persons personating qualified voters."

"5. The declared number of votes largely exceeded the number of bona fide votes cast for Mr. Macnish.

"6. A large number of ballots cast for Mr. McDiarmid was in some nefarious and corrupt manner manipulated whereby the result of the election was rendered doubtful.

"7. There are good reasons to believe that there are many specific and well-authenticated cases where agents of Mr. Macnish concealed at their homes some of the strangers, who paid large sums of money to electors to induce them to vote for Mr. Macnish."

After this terrible summary of the means whereby the election was carried, Mr. Macnish offered to resign his seat. It was however, necessary that evidence sufficient to void the election should be heard; and the court received proof of the ballot-stuffing charges, the sheriff, who acted as returning officer, admitting that the strangers imported into the constituency to manipulate the ballots were employed by him on the recommendation of certain parties.

—A government inspector of food products recently brought into court samples of soda-water syrups used in the majority of fountains. Not one of them contained a particle of fruit juice.
