Let's Talk It Over

Summerside High School has opened its doors for another school year. The 1954-55 year begins with four beautiful new classrooms, with the promise of two more in the near future, but minus its auditorium, a feature of the school which has played an important part in the education of those who have attended Summerside High through the years.

On its stage Summerside pupils have carried out very many different forms of exercises and programs, stimulating to the minds and hearts, both of those who performed and of those who listened. Many distinguished and interesting

people, leaders in various fields of endeavour, have given their inspiring messages to the pupils brought from their classrooms to hear. There excursions to the auditorium were valuable, not only because of the inspiration and instruction obtained from the speakers' messages, but also because they were diversions from the everyday routine of ordinary school work.

Prills, and furbelows, do you say? We should think that indeed Summerside High School might be one of the principal targets for those who would take us back to the "little red schoolhouse" where the three "R's" were, (if you can believe the old scholars with the stars of yesterday in their eyes) so assiduously cultivated. Certainly the high school authorities in Summerside have been among the most adventurous in wandering beyond the boundaries of convention. Like Ulysses, they have steered their course towards new frontiers. The pupils were not asked to bake a cake, warble a folksong, sew a seam, or paint a picture. All good old-time mathematics, English analysis and parsing.
