SECOND DAY.

A Large Attendance.

THE HORSES JUDGED.

RACES THIS AFTERNOON.

This morning dawned gray and cold. But the day brightened and warmed as it went on. After one o'clock the volume of visitors began to increase. Many strangers came to see the products of the Island Province. Altogether the attendance was large. Interest was for a time centered in the prize ring. Then the great attraction was the horse races.

Dr. Gunside, of Ontario, arrived last evening to judge the horses on exhibition, and the work was begun at an early hour this morning in the presence of a large number of interested and admiring spectators. All parts of the Province, East and West, North and South were represented in this department. Mr. John Richards, deserves the credit of having brought seven very fine animals all the way from Bideford. Three of these were pure Clydesdales—the Knight of Ardgowan and two of his well-grown and well-proportioned sons. Two were carriage fillies by All Right and Hernando—beautiful animals both—and most interesting of all a little Shetland mare and her son. The mother is thirty-seven inches high and the son twenty-four inches high. They are probably the smallest bits of horseflesh in Canada, and they attract a good deal of attention on account of their smallness and beauty. The class of carriage stallions, including Premier, Royal Frenchman, The Gem, Parnell, Capt Jeff, and other splendid animals, made a keen and lively competition, taxing Dr. Gunside's ability and powers of discrimination to the utmost. Another class included the stallions Hernando, Golden, Principal, and Westlaw; while the class of cart stallions included such animals as Knight of Ardgowan, Lucky Lad, Honest Lincoln, Lucky Harry, General Burnett and Liberty. Messrs. Clow and Poole deserve great credit for their contribution to the horse show. George Tweedy, George E. Hughes, Esq., and McRae & Robins were among the leading exhibitors of horseflesh. It was simply impossible for THE EXAMINER to obtain the names of all the farmers from the country who exhibited first-class animals. The prize list will include those which are most worthy of notice.

The floral exhibit is the best we have ever had, not only in number and variety, but also in rare and beautiful plants. Of Geraniums the display is much finer and larger than ever before shown in this Province. The Gladioli are beautiful and large. In Dahlias, the show is very large, and the competition sharp. The flowers are perfect.

The Begonias on exhibition are nearly all tuberous-rooted. The flowers are large, brilliant in color, and both single and double. There were also Rex and Metallic (Begonias), and a few of the new varieties.

In Fuchsias and Roses the show is small. Ornamental Foliage Plants—in ferns there are Pteris and adiantum, Caladium, Yucca, Draecena, Bryophyllum, Opuntia, &c. They are the finest we ever had on exhibition in respect to both quantity and quality. The Coleus varied and beautiful.

In cut flowers and bouquets the show is varied and fine. In some cases the quality is not quite up to that of former years, but in others far surpassing it. The table design is very pretty. The Hydrangea paniculata grandiflora was very fine. As the shrub is perfectly hardy it can be grown in any garden.

We ought not to have overlooked Norton & Fennell's exhibit, comprising buggy tops, saws, a good collection of handsome belting, etc., the whole forming a valuable and attractive addition to the show.

Mark Wright & Co. (Ltd) show a combined reaping machine and fanners in operation. The machine does its work well.

The exhibit of agricultural machinery by Alex. Horn & Co. is large and excellent. It includes two combined reapers and binders and a large number of plows and harrows.

Mr. Mauley, of the S. S. Carroll, exhibits a model of the American screw-yacht Volunteer, the workmanship on which is admirable. The model is attracting much attention.

The Exhibition Building was brilliant last evening with electric light. A boiler has been put up on the grounds, and both incandescent and arc lights were exhibited under the supervision of Mr. McBurney, of the Thomson-Houston Company, of Boston, and Mr. James Waddell, of the P. E. Island Electric Company. The effect produced was fine.
