U. S. Gov't Has Huge Claim In Basketball Case

NEW YORK, Feb. 24—(AP)—The Government placed a huge income tax lien yesterday against Salvatore T. Sollazzo, who allegedly spent thousands to fix college basketball games.

With interest and penalties, the Government's claim amounts to \$1,128,463. The effect of the lien was to freeze Sollazzo's assets until the Government can collect whatever it may be entitled to. Sollazzo is being held without bail, accused of bribing cage stars from three New York colleges to fix basketball games. The colleges involved are Long Island University, City College of New York and New York University.

Eight players or former players, are said to have admitted making \$25,000 in bribes for their part in the alleged fix.

The income tax lien lists allegedly unpaid taxes running into hundreds of thousands of dollars for each of the years from 1943 to 1947.

There was no indication from the Government as to the source of Sollazzo's income during those years. He is a jewelry manufacturer.

The Internal Revenue Bureau, it was learned, went over Sollazzo's income status months ago, long before the big basketball scandal broke here last week-end. As a result of the cage scandal, Long Island University has cancelled its remaining basketball games for this season. Five other schools also have pulled out of Madison Square Garden since the scandal broke.

District Attorney Frank Hogan pushed ahead with his probe of the big fix — the fourth and largest bribe scandal to hit the college sport since 1945.

ROSIERY

Some centuries ago practically everybody wore red stockings; at another period white were the style; then just a few years back it was good taste to wear black. Now, if a woman appears in grey stockings, when others are wearing fawn, she feels that a dreadful mistake has been made. We must follow the fashions. Hosiery has always been varied. Strangely enough, song birds are most moderate in their choice of coloured hosiery: the majority wear inconspicuous browns or greys. But some Thrushes and many small Warblers prefer flesh-colour. One Warbler, the Redstart, and the Catbird give us examples of dark hosiery in Birdland, while the Mourning Dove's is a beautiful red.

Ducks' stockings come in a variety of colours. Pintails and Baldpates are black, the Wood Ducks' yellow, Mallards' and Shovelers' orange, Black Ducks' brownish, or the male Mergansers' vermilion, though their wives are orange. Canada Geese have black, Snow Geese red, and White-fronted Geese yellow. The popular shade for Hawks' is yellow, but Fish Hawks' are pale grey.

If you were given an outline drawing of a Gull, what colour would you paint the legs? Our well known Herring Gull should be given flesh-coloured legs and feet, but Franklin's should be black, the California Gull's grey green, Bonaparte's red and the Ring-billed's yellowish or greenish. There is a kind of Gull called a Kittiwake with dark brown or black legs, nevertheless another is actually called the "Red-legged Kittiwake."

The long stockings of our various shore birds come in nearly all the colours. Sometimes this proves valuable to us in identifying certain species. With only 1-4 inch difference in size, two tiny Sandpipers, the Least and the Semipalmated, are both known as "Peeps". But the former's back has a rusty tinge and its legs are olive green, whereas, the latter's back is greyer, and its legs black.

Some white, long-legged waders look very much alike: their size is not identical, but this is difficult to judge unless the two are seen simultaneously. Leg colour is then important. The Ameri-

Business Spotlight

Canadians sell to other countries great quantities of raw materials and sometimes they get worried about it.

At such times they wonder whether they shouldn't make more of these raw materials into finished or semi-finished goods before letting them go.

In this connection, the current monthly review of the Bank of Nova Scotia has a word of encouragement and indicates that perhaps we are doing better than we think. In a survey of changes by the Canadian economy since the late '20's it comments:

"One of the most important aspects of Canada's growth has been the increasing degree to which wood and base metals have been processed in this country rather than exported in the raw or semi-processed form."

"Another major development has been the increasing Canadian content of many manufactured products resulting from the growth of parts manufacturing and the great expansion of such industries as metal fabrication and chemicals."

"However, the range of basis production has considerably broadened, with the enormous increase of aluminum output, the oil discoveries in Alberta, and the development of the great iron and titanium deposits of Quebec and Ontario, while the supply of fuel and power has been enlarged both by the new oil and gas fields and by the further expansion of hydro-electric capacity."

"This country has the good fortune to be comparatively rich in resources of a kind that have been growing less plentiful in the United States and in the world at large, particularly woods and minerals."

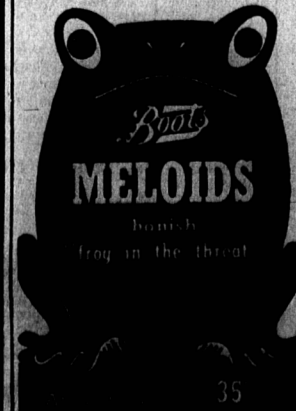
"Even in regard to grains, there is a good deal to suggest that, despite exchange problems and efforts at self-sufficiency abroad, the long-range trend is in our favor, and meanwhile the growth of the domestic economy has been such as to reduce sharply and in some cases eliminate export surpluses of other farm products."

The current issue of the Bank of Nova Scotia Review is its 250th, and begins the 25th year of publication, in which time it has become known for its careful analyses, written clearly and interestingly.

For the occasion, Douglas Gibson, economist of the bank and the Review's editor since 1935, has re-read the 249 preceding issues and from them compiles an economic story of the last quarter-century.

He finds that the physical quantity of Canada's production was some 30 per cent greater in 1949 than in 1929 and adds:
