

the Second District of Prince County, the Sheriff's Court was opened at about 11 o'clock, at St. Eleanor's, and Dr. Conroy and the Hon. the Treasurer were respectively proposed and seconded. The Doctor made a very short speech, and shortly after left St. Eleanor's, in company with Mr. Montgomery and the very few friends he had there to support him. The Speaker was there, but deserted the Doctor, without offering a word in defence of his friend, as soon as he found the opinions of the electors present to be decidedly adverse to himself and Doctor Conroy. We have never, upon any similar occasion, in this Island, saw a greater concourse of people. There could not have been many less than 1000 persons present, gathered from the various sections of the District, including all the respectable and influential voters; and out of that vast multitude not one individual came forward to raise his voice for Dr. Conroy or the party who back him. The speechifying, which lasted for several hours, was therefore altogether on the side of the Liberals. Townsend's corner was beautifully decorated with flags, principally in honor of Mr. Pope; and the Tryon Band, drawn by four horses, was in attendance at St. Eleanor's during the whole day, at intervals enlivening the multitude with their spirit stirring strains. In the afternoon the Hon. Treasurer, and four other members of the Government, were honoured by a public chairing up and down the village.

From the first we did not for a moment doubt the success of Mr. Pope; we are now more confident than ever; and he must be sceptical indeed, who, witnessing the manifestation of feeling at St. Eleanor's, on Thursday, could entertain any other opinion than this—that the Treasurer's re-election, by a very large majority, is a moral certainty. Dr. Conroy's friends—(and though politically opposed, we are certainly not amongst the number of his enemies)—must regret that he was so ill advised as to put himself in opposition on this occasion.

Latest Intelligence.

EARTHQUAKE AT GUADALOUPE.—A very severe shock of an earthquake occurred at Guadeloupe on the morning of the 17th May. It was most severely felt at the south side of the island. A great many houses were thrown down and the plantations all over the country received more or less injury. It does not appear that any lives were lost.

The Legislature of Delaware passed a law at its last session, making the sale of intoxicating drinks on the Sabbath, an offence subjecting the offender to a fine of \$20 for the first offence, and \$50 for the second.

A collision between a steamer and schooner took place on Lake Erie, ten miles off Cleveland, 7th inst, the latter was sunk in seven fathoms; her cargo 10,000 bushels of wheat, and hull a total loss—crew saved.

We have heard it intimated that the Government have it under consideration, to pull down the present Government House, in this city, immediately after the removal of the Public Offices to Quebec, and to expend some twenty or thirty thousand pounds in erecting buildings upon its site, commensurate to the wants of the various departements. This is evidently intended as a tub to the whale, and is certainly an ingenious method of allaying opposition.—[Toronto Patriot.]

A number of the inhabitants of Montreal have petitioned the governor General to take into consideration the propriety and feasibility of constructing a ship canal from the river St. Lawrence to Lake Champlain. The memorialists show the great amount of business now doing on the Ogdensburgh Railroad, and think that if counteracting public works be not constructed in Canada, the revenues of the Canada canals will be materially impaired, and her commerce injuriously affected.

THE CHOLERA is on the increase in the Western States, and proves very fatal.

SHOCKING OCCURRENCE.—A soldier belonging to the 38th Regt., named Prentiss, quartered in the Military Hospital at Halifax, shot himself on the 17th instant, while in a temporary fit of insanity. Deceased had been in the Service about thirty years, and had no less than seven good conduct badges.

WONDERFUL CANARY.—A London paper advertises a beautiful canary to be disposed of, which speaks ten different languages, and can solve any difficult problem in Euclid.

At the present time, two of the best newspapers in the B. W. Indies—*Morning Journal* in Jamaica and the *West Indian* in Barbadoes—are owned and edited by gentlemen of colour.

ARRIVAL OF TROOPS.

The *Brigt. Marie*, Boudrot, five days from Halifax, arrived here on Thursday morning the 19th, having on board a Company of the 42d Royal Highlanders, under the command of the Hon. Capt. Rollo, and Lieut. Oude. The company landed in full dress, about three hours after their arrival in port, and marched to the Garrison: the martial sound of the pibroch, and the High and costume (kilts) collected a number of persons together to witness their landing.

In the afternoon the Company of the 38th Regt. under the command of Capt. Leckey and Lieut. Hume, stationed in Charlottetown for the past year, embarked on board the *Marie*, and she sailed again for Halifax in the evening.—1st.

St. JOHN'S, N. F., May 29.—The schr. *Totness*, of Dartmouth, F. G. Emmett, master, sailed from Plymouth on the 10th April, bound for the Labrador, with supplies for the fishery. On the 4th inst., in lat. 53, lon. 46, the vessel struck a pan of ice, which stove in the larboard bow, and in 15 minutes she filled and went down, the master and crew having barely sufficient time to get out the boat, into which they put a compass and about 40 lbs. bread. On the day following, it blew a smart gale from the S. E., with snow, and in the evening it was deemed advisable to take to the ice and haul up the boat. Six men got upon one pan, and eight upon another. During the night the pans separated, owing to a heavy sea running, and at daylight next morning nothing could be seen of the six hands. It is supposed they must have perished during the night. After eleven days of extreme suffering, they were fallen in with by the sealing schr. *British Queen*, and carried into Greenspond. The survivors (with the exception of one man left in a dying condition at the latter place) arrived here on Saturday last, three of them very badly frost-bitten, and likely to suffer amputation of the feet.
