

Leafs & Rangers Play 4-4 Draw

TORONTO (CP) — Defenceman Lou Fontinato's goal with less than five minutes left in the game, Wednesday night gave New York Rangers a 4-4 tie with Toronto Maple Leafs in a battle for the fourth and last National Hockey League playoff position.

The tie left Leafs in fourth place with 41 points, five more than fifth-place Rangers.

Fontinato's goal at 15:19 of the third was made possible by some loose playing on the part of the Toronto defence.

Bathgate scored a pair for Rangers while leftwinger Parker Macdonald added the other. Centre George Armstrong, leftwinger Bob Pulford, rightwinger Ron Stewart and defenceman Marc Reame were Leafs' scorers.

Leafs held a 2-0 lead by the midway of the first and were ahead 2-1 at the end. In second, Rangers went ahead 3-2 before Leafs tied. Each team scored once in the final 20 minutes. Rangers displayed a fast and neat passing attack in the middle frame when they took

the lead. Leafs had a territorial edge in play during the first and last periods.

Both goaltenders were required to cover for some sloppy playing by defencemen.

Referee Lou Maschio handed out six minor penalties.

CARROLL OUT FOR ONE GAME

Phil MacGee Is Suspended For Remainder Of Season

Island Senior Hockey League President Cleaver MacLean announced yesterday that Phil MacGee, newly acquired center of Montague Primroses, has been suspended from competition in the Island league for the remainder of the season because of an incident which occurred in Tuesday's game against St. Dunstan's.

Another Montague player Dick Carroll has been suspended for one game because of another incident arising out of the same game.

MacGee was suspended for hitting Saints defenceman Gerald Murphy with his stick during a scuffle in the second period of Tuesday's game Carroll drew the wrath of league officials for deliberately tripping referee Don Whelan with one second remaining in the game.

With the suspensions president MacLean also issued a stern warning that a repeat of such incidents by any player on any team will be dealt with more severely and in the case of a player deliberately swinging his stick at another, the offending player may draw a suspension for life.

The suspension in effect will bar

His presence at the practice session was supposed to have been a great big secret; however, we doubt that there was more than one of those youngsters who didn't know that a big time talent scout was sitting in the stands taking things in. Passadore in case you don't know, is the fellow who spotted Forbes Kennedy and Angie Carroll for the Canadiens. We only saw him copy down the name of one youngster at the practice last night, although there may have been more. We know you would like to know the name of the youngster that caught his eye but that would be telling tales out of school and might put a bit of undue pressure on the kid who is still in midget competition.
