Several Factors Retard Changes In Education Field, Teachers Told

Factors retarding educational change in the province were outlined yesterday by Charles Campbell, president of the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation. Mr. Campbell was addressing some 900 Island teachers in the opening session of their three-day annual convention at Birchwood High School.

He who pays the piper can decide not to call the tune," Mr. Campbell said. "Teachers themselves sometimes were reluctant to depart from established methods, techniques, and even textbooks, Mr. Campbell said. Pointing out that teachers should be leaders in promoting educational changes, he said "even if methods you are using now are successful, this does not mean that more successful methods do not exist."

Teachers discussed during the past session of the Legislature. He said it was hoped to have a statutory revision of the School Act at the next session. Dr. Dewar also mentioned progress which had been made in the province's secondary school system and noted that the elementary system required attention. Gregory Clark Named To News Hall Of Fame

TORONTO (CP) - Gregory Clark, veteran Toronto newspaper man, was named Wednesday as first honorary member of a newly-instituted News Hall of Fame. George Retzlaff, chairman of National Press Week, announced the selection of Mr. Clark, in recognition of his contribution to the newspaper profession during the 53 years he has been a reporter and columnist.

Now 72, Mr. Clark is associate editor of Weekend Magazine and although his columns no longer appear on a weekly basis he still contributes articles to that publication. Sponsors by the Toronto Men's Press Club, the hall of fame is planned to be ready by the spring of 1966 and likely will be set up in the club's headquarters. It will include honor rolls of winners of major press awards, such as the National Newspaper Awards. Announcement of selection of Mr. Clark as first honorary member coincides with National Press Week, April 19-25, which culminates this weekend with the annual Byline Ball Friday night and the newspaper awards dinner Saturday at which Premier Jean Lesage of Quebec will be the speaker. Eight Canadian newspaper men, judged best in their fields of writing, cartooning and photography, will receive \$400 each and certificates at the awards dinner in Toronto.

miles from Charlottetown, only three voters turned up and they all voted "yes".

KINGS COUNTY

Results were available from two polls in the Souris area. In one the verdict was 16 favoring the plan and four against. In the other poll the score was 14 in favor and six against.

PREVIOUS VOTES

There have been four previous Potato Marketing Board plebiscites. The Guardian learned yesterday, if one includes a "sort of Gallup Poll" the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture held in 1950.

The simple question at that time, asked voters - if they were in favor of a potato marketing board in principle. The result was a "yes" vote of 6,723 and a "no" vote of only 35.

In May 1954, 6,745 ballots were mailed out to prospective voters and 5,140 of them were returned. The people were asked if they favored continuation of a potato marketing board and 3,282 answered "yes" and 1,845 said "no". There were 35 rejected ballots.

In November of the same year, 1954, as a result of numerous complaints to the effect that people had not been given a chance to express their opinion on the merits, or otherwise, of a central marketing agency, another plebiscite was held and this time there were two questions.

The first one asked are you in favor of retaining the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board? and 3,958 said "yes" and 1,977 said "no".

The other half of the ballot asked "are you in favor of a compulsory one-desk selling agency to be operated by the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board?"

This question really stirred controversy and some of the meetings fairly dripped with venom as the rival factions advanced their arguments, and meeting chairmen were hard put to maintain order.

The voters rejected the compulsory one-desk selling agency by a score of 2,991 to 2,706. The potato crop of the previous year 1953, had been marketed here through a compulsory one-desk selling agency and that was done because the federal government was subsidizing the industry by guaranteeing a certain price, and it had to be handled through a single agency so it could be handled in a manner that would be acceptable to the government at Ottawa, it was explained.

On that occasion a federation of agriculture spokesmen recalled yesterday, the counties of Prince and Kings favored the one desk selling idea but Queens defeated it.

The last plebiscite prior to yesterday was held here in Oct. 30, 1957. The question was simply "Are you in favor of retaining the Potato Marketing Board?" The combined vote of the three counties rejected the board's retention 1,064 to 1,017. Again the result was close. But this time Queens Voters favored the board's retention 511 to 317. Prince rejected it when only 263 supported the board and 434 voted against it. In Kings the verdict was 243 favoring the board's retention and 313 opposed.
