An unknown man was killed on the Inter-colonial Railway, at River Side Station on Wednesday evening.

A MAN named Terry, left Dover on the 28th ult., at 9 o'clock in the morning, on a floating tricycle, to cross the English Channel. He arrived at Calais the next day, at 5 p. m.

R. STEEL left to-day for Kensington Park with Abdallah Queen, Young Hambletonian, and Andy Scott. The races take place on the eighth and are expected to be very interesting.

MR. ARCHIBALD, the Superintendent, has given instructions for the putting in of a number of sidings on the Thunder Bay branch, of the Canada Pacific Railway, owing to the increase of traffic.

SOME sensational run-getting has been registered this season by young as well as old. Mr. E. M. Grace has already scored upwards of 2,000 runs this year, and among his principal innings are 243, 193 not out, 171, two scores of 150 not out, and 117. Six times he has been credited with a total of over 100 runs, and the average up to last week for Thornbury was 94, 16-18 per innings.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

What Parnell Thinks.

DUBLIN, August 3. Parnell says that Irishmen all the world over should rejoice because of the death of the villain Carey. That justice, denied by the Government, had overtaken him at last. Measures for the safety of Dublin officials have been re-established.

Deaths from Cholera.

LONDON, August 3. It is estimated that about eleven thousand people lost their lives by cholera in Egypt. Among these are eighty from British troops, including a Captain and Doctor.

A Second Shock.

NAPLES, August 3. A second shock of earthquake occurred at Ischia yesterday, but without fatal results. All work was stopped and great terror manifested.

Up in a Balloon.

LONDON, August 3. Simmons, the aeronaut, successfully crossed the English Channel yesterday in a balloon.

A Fenian Plot.

MONTREAL, August 3. A Yankee invincible says that there exists a plot to assassinate Lord Landsdowne on his arrival in Canada.

The Carey Murder.

LONDON, Aug. 3. A despatch to the Daily News from Cape Town says it has transpired that O'Donnell, the murderer of Carey, is an American citizen, and a native of Ohio.

A Frightful Explosion.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 2. The dry hot weather continues here, and forest fires are raging. Yesterday afternoon the heat from forest fires ignited the powder in Onderdonk's mill near Yale, which blew up three hundred and sixty cases giant, and ten cases black powder. No lives were lost, but several people were badly injured.

Cholera in Egypt.

LONDON, August 3. There were 877 deaths from cholera in Egypt on Wednesday, including 273 at Cairo. The cholera at Bombay is declared to be epidemic. There were 101 deaths there last week.

The Irish Murder, Conspirators.

LONDON, July 3. The steamer in which Michael Kavanagh, Joseph Hanlan, Peter Carey, Joseph Smith, and six other Irish murder conspirators sailed has arrived at South Australia.

The Operators' Strike.

BOSTON, Aug. 3. All the operators of the railroads refusing commercial business at the demand of the strikers are being promptly discharged.

Telegraph Notes.

Bake Jones, the colored boy murderer, who, in an unprovoked attack, killed John Foster about a year ago at Pittsburgh, Pa., has been sentenced to be hanged on October fourth.

Private telegrams received at Berlin state that there was a slight earthquake on the Island of Ischia on the 24th of July, but the fact was hushed up by the authorities for fear visitors might be deterred from visiting the island.

King Alfonso and Queen Christina arrived at the Royal Palace of San Ilderfonso La Granja on the 1st. The king went to the frontier to meet his royal spouse. This fact dissipates whatever may still remain of the theory that they had quarreled.

Preparations are complete for the rowing regatta at lake Minnetonka to-day. Six men start: Hanlan, Plaisted, Riley, Hosmer, Lee and Turner. It is expected Hanlan will win, and for the second place Hosmer and Turner are favorites. The race will be rowed in two heats three men each; on Thursday the best two men in each heat will row the final heat.

The executive committee of seven of the Irish National Leagues of America were in session at Manhattan Beach Hotel on the 1st inst., all the members being present. Patrick Egan and Matthew Harris, of Ireland, were also present. Among the most important of the subjects considered was that of land grabbing in southern territories by English aristocrats and English corporations. A committee was appointed with instructions to secure a report in each State and territory of the quantity of land purchased, names of the purchasers and a statement showing whether or not such persons are citizens of the United States.

Fifteen hundred tons of chloride of lime were used at Casamicciola for doring purposes, but the stench in upper town is still unbearable. Water gushed violently out of the spring again. It was almost boiling hot. A slight shock was felt on Monday night. Two guards were killed. The military prevent the landing of all persons not provided with special passes. The latest advices from Casamicciola say that a great number of English and Americans arrived in search of friends and relations supposed to be victims of the calamity. An American lady reports that her aunt is missing, and it is feared she is buried in the ruins. One family has been rescued after having been buried thirty-six hours in the ruins. Of a Swiss family numbering eight only one daughter survives. She states she heard her father

groaning several hours before she herself was rescued. The Syndic states that 1,000 are dead at Lacco, 1,000 at Formi, and 2,500 at Casamicciola. The damage to property is 2,000,000 lire. The Bishop of Casamicciola, who was killed, was Monsignor Mazella, who was recognized in Partibus for his devoted services at the earthquake at Casamicciola in 1881.

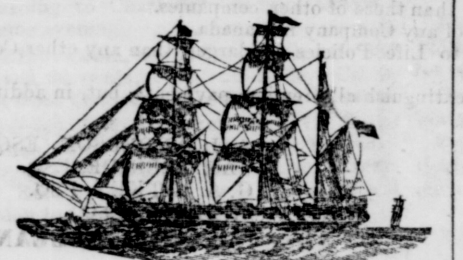
