GLACE BAY, N.S., Jan. 8—(CP)—Halifax Atlantics widened their margin at the top of the Maritime Major Hockey League tonight with a 4-1 win over tail-end Glace Bay Miners.

The Halifax win in the only league tilt of the night gave them 53 points, 11 better than second-rung Charlottetown Islanders. Atlantics applied pressure throughout and were given strong support from goalie Roy McMeekin who turned aside 33 potential goals. Bob Bowness, Bill Ford, Muckle Hollett and Hughie Campbell were the Halifax marksmen. Hub Macey spoiled McMeekin's try for a shut-out with Glace Bay's only goal at the 17:33 mark of the third period. Atlantics had a 2-0 bulge at the end of the first period and added another goal in the second. For the first two periods, despite the score, the play was close and McMeekin even handled one more shot than Don Lockhart in the Miners net.
