Cabinet Changes Made By Roblin

WINNIPEG (CP) — Appointments of three new members to the Manitoba cabinet and one change in portfolio have been announced by Premier Duff Roblin.

Mr. R. Carrall, previously labour minister, takes over the welfare portfolio which has been announced by Health Minister George Johnson.

Obie Bailey, member for the Winnipeg riding of Osborne since 1949, becomes labour minister.

Robert G. Smellie, 39, member of the legislature for Bird's Russell since 1959, becomes municipal affairs minister. The post had been held by Works Minister Walter Weir since the appointment of former minister John Thompson to the Manitoba bench last fall.

A. W. Harrison, 64, who has represented Rock Lake since 1945 and been speaker of the legislature since 1958, joins the cabinet as minister without portfolio.

Christ Was Human Yet Divine

(Editor's note: The following material relating to tomorrow's Sunday School lesson with scriptural references to Mark 9:25 is based on an evangelist outline produced by the Division of Christian Education, National Council of Churches, in the U.S. and is used by permission.)

CHRIST'S UNUSUAL combination of divinity and humanity is nowhere more sharply set forth than in today's lesson where Mark relates in immediate succession the Transfiguration of Christ and His very human healing of a demon-possessed boy.

Our story opens six days after the concluding account of last week's lesson, Peter's confession of Christ in Caesarea Philippi. Scripture Union Secretary Will Speak In S'side, Ch'town

Rev. Anthony C. Capon, Toronto, general secretary of the Scripture Union, has arrived in Charlottetown and will preach at several island churches and speak to various groups during the next few days. The Scripture Union is an international society for promotion of the study of the Bible.

"I think there is a lot of people who want to understand the Bible," says Mr. Capon. "The Scripture Union encourages people in daily reading of the Bible and applying it to their personal lives. The Bible is an up-to-date book providing what is read and understood."

The union provides a graded program of study for all ages from pre-school to adults. Notes of explanation are provided.

The group is international in scope, and was founded officially in 1879 in Switzerland. There are now about 1,500,000 members enrolled in the various sections.

In Canada the organized society is about 10 years old, and according to Mr. Capon, membership is increasing quite steadily. Those who subscribe to the series are reckoned as members. It is hoped by the union that this method will be adopted all through the world.

Mr. Capon came to Canada six years ago from New York and where he was an Anglican minister. He will preach at the Summerdale Baptist Church on Sunday morning and at Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, on Sunday evening. He will address an after church gathering at St. Paul's Anglican Church at 8:30 p.m. and the First Baptist Church Men's Association Monday.

He leaves Tuesday for Halifax and St. John's, Nfld., before the end of April.

Ice Patrol Gets Ready

BOSTON (AP) — The U.S. Coast Guard announced today that the International Ice Patrol will begin ice information broadcasts next week, warning of shifting moving bergs.

The coast guard said a mid-January flight revealed that icebergs south of Cape Cod, Labrador. With an average drift of several miles a day, it has been predicted that not more than two icebergs will drift south of St. John's, Nfld., before the end of April.

"As in past years, ice information broadcasts by coast guard radio station NIK will be twice daily. Special broadcasts will be made as necessary."

The International Ice Patrol was organized as a result of the sinking of the Titanic with the loss of more than 1,500 lives on the Grand Banks 51 years ago.

The patrol is conducted entirely by the U.S. Coast Guard but its expenses are shared by 17 countries whose merchant vessels ply the north Atlantic.

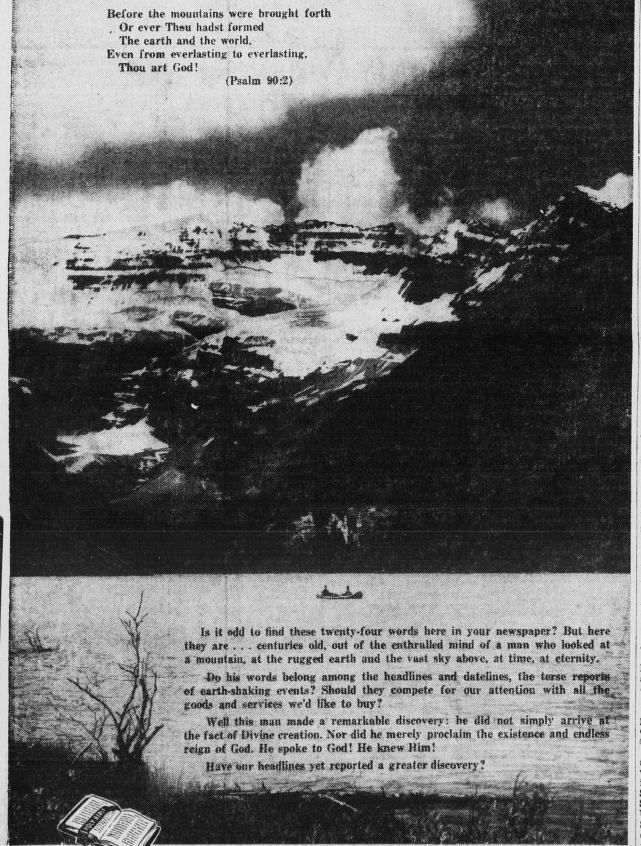
