Singer Appoints National Director Of Sales
E. J. DesROCHES
E. J. DesRoches has been appointed to the newly created post of National Director of Sales for the Singer Sewing Machine Company in Canada. Singer's Canadian retail activities had formerly been supervised from the United States and will now be under one all-Canada operation, directed by DesRoches. He will supervise the retail sales activities of approximately 185 Singer Sewing Centers across Canada managed by more than 1800 sales employees. The appointment of B. Bourget of Thurso, P.Q., General Manager of Singer manufacturing operations in Canada was announced April.

Mr. DesRoches will open his headquarters in Oakville, Ontario which will be complete in September. All sales, counting and collection functions will be under his supervision.
Born in LaFontaine, Ontario Mr. DesRoches joined the Singer Organization in 1931. After he managed Singer Sales in London and Sarnia, he came a District Manager of Western Ontario in 1938 and Sales Supervisor for the Ontario area in 1939. Subsequently transferred to Winnipeg, he was appointed General Agent in 1952.
H. T. Reed who was former Assistant in the area has been appointed to succeed Mr. DesRoches in charge of sales in Western Canada.
