Mr. Pope's Lecture Before the Y. M. C. A.

A gentleman who was present reports that Mr. Percy Pope's paper on Agnosticism and Religion, read before the Association on Thursday evening last, was a very carefully and ably prepared compendium of a subject which is now exercising the minds of many of the best scholars of the age. Mr. Pope, within the short space of time at his disposal, (about an hour) succeeded in showing and defining, and to a certain extent in vindicating what is understood by this agnostic doctrine and its relation to the Christian religion, apart from the belief in inspiration as given in the Sacred Scriptures. And as we understood the argument, it consists largely in the belief in the Fatherhood of God, and Brotherhood of Christ, or in other words the Religion of Humanity, without the atonement, in fact, very much the doctrine set forth in the work known as "Robert Elmsere."

Judge Hensley, who occupied the chair, commented on the Lecture, and so did the President. A cordial vote of thanks was voted to Mr. Pope for his services.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Bait Act.

HALIFAX, April 4.

Advices from St. John's, Nfld., say a catastrophe has fallen upon the Colony. The Government have decided not to enforce the Bait Act. French, American and Canadian will be permitted to purchase bait in our harbors upon the payment of tonnage and license fees, but the exportation of bait to St. Pierre will be prohibited. The object of the Bait Act was wholly to prevent the French from obtaining bait. The object of the new proposition is to give them all the bait they need in return for license fees. The new regulation will, therefore, be a practical repeal of the Bait Act. There is great dissatisfaction expressed by all classes.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, April 4.

The Wimbledon team leaves for England June 18th in the steamer P. Lynesian.

A prominent member of the Council to-day vouchsafed the opinion that the session may not terminate until the end of May.

Professor Saunders left yesterday for Montreal for the purpose of distributing five thousand bushels of two-rowed barley among the farmers of the Dominion which had arrived from Halifax, this being the first shipment from London. Applications for this improved barley are still being received by the Department of Agriculture.

Canadian Finances.

OTTAWA, April 4.

The Dominion finances for the nine months of the current fiscal year continue to be of a most healthy character. The revenue up to March 31st was \$29,118,000, and the expenditure \$22,764,000, showing a surplus of \$6,354,000. The revenue is \$1,117,000 more than last year, whereas the expenditure is, in round numbers, a million less. The total net debt on March 31st was \$234,637,261, showing a decrease of \$1,509,603 in the month. The expenditure for capital account was \$4,286,149 for the nine months.

Stanley Interviewed.

LONDON, April 4.

The Times correspondent at Cairo has had an interview with Stanley, in which the latter said: Emin had both English and German offers, and he cannot be blamed if he thought the German offers preferable. It is likely matters were misrepresented to him during his illness. He probably thinks his absence the best plan. If he wins over the Arabs he will add to his reputation. Emin's proclamation reveals a soreness, and was unnecessary.

More British Money.

LOCKPORT, N. Y., April 4.

A gigantic deal between an English syndicate and four of the largest paper mill owners in the State is about perfected, the plants are Rochester Paper Co., Hudson River Paper Co. at Palmer's Falls, Glens Falls Paper Mill Co., and the Remington Paper Co. at Walerstown. The purchase money reach eighties millions.

School Question.

TORONTO, April 4.

Mr. Craig of the Opposition opened the debate on the French School question yesterday afternoon, and spoke two hours, introducing his amendment to the Government bill. A division was taken at 2.30 this morning, when Craig's bill was defeated 51 to 30.

Put in For Coal.

HALIFAX, April 4.

The Glasgow Line steamer Utopia, from Naples and Gibraltar for New York, put in here to-day for coal. She has 550 immigrants, the toughest crowd that ever struck these shores.

Rome and Germany.

ROME, April 4.

The Vatican has instructed the Papal Nuncio at Berlin to act in energetic accord with the leader of the German Centrist Party, and to yield to the government on no point without securing in return real and adequate concessions.

He Will Not Go.

BERLIN, April 4.

The Czar's intention to make a hunting excursion to Poland has been abandoned. A decoy train supposed to contain the Czar was wrecked by rocks placed on the tracks.

Obituary.

LONDON, April 4.

The Marquis of Normanby is dead at Brighton, in his 72nd year. At different times he held the Governorships of Nova Scotia, Queensland, New Zealand and Victoria.

Rev. Mr. Whitman's Case.

HE IS FOUND GUILTY AND EXPELLED FROM THE CHURCH.

On the 26th March last, a committee of sixteen members of the Baptist Church was appointed to enquire into the truth or falsity of certain reports circulated in regard to the conduct of Rev. Edward Whitman, while he was pastor of that church, and which reports did not reach the church until after that gentleman's departure for Joliet, Ill. The committee had three sessions—two on the day after appointment, and one on the Saturday following. At these sessions written as well as verbal evidence was taken. The Committee carefully weighed this evidence, and submitted their report to the congregation last night. The report showed that the committee had found Rev. Mr. Whitman guilty on the following counts:—

- 1. Associating with a young woman under an assumed name.
- 2. Misappropriation of Church Funds.
- 3. Untruthfulness.

With reference to the first charge, it was shown that Mr. Whitman had visited a young woman named Mary McWilliams, at her residence, Belmont, some miles west of Summerside, going there under the name of George E. Churchill. Two visits were made by him to this house in the summer of 1888. On the second visit, it is alleged, the girl's father followed Whitman into Summerside and began action against him for visiting his house under an assumed name. The matter, however, was settled quietly on Mr. Whitman's paying over a sum of money to the plaintiff. Mr. Whitman claimed that he had letters in his possession which show that the action of Miss McWilliams' father was a blackmailing scheme; but he did not produce these letters, saying they were in the custody of his lawyer at Joliet. He also asserted that the money he paid over to McWilliams had been refunded.

With reference to the second charge or count: The defendant claimed that the money had miscarried while in the hands of a second party in transit to the treasurer. Before Mr. Whitman's arrival here he acknowledged his responsibility for the amount in default, upwards of \$100, and, as restitution, gave the treasurer a promissory note, which, however, was vitiated, as it was in the form of an agreement. The committee refused to accept this alleged promissory note, and sustained the charge of misappropriation.

The third count was sustained by written and verbal statements, which were conclusive to the minds of the Committee. The meeting last evening, at which the Committee's report was presented for approval by the congregation, was largely attended; in fact the building was filled. When the report was submitted, only a few of the congregation opposed its adoption. On motion, the letter of dismissal, for which Mr. Whitman asked, was refused, and he was expelled from membership in the church. This letter of dismissal, it may be explained, if granted, would show that Mr. Whitman was in good standing in the church, and it was for the purpose of obtaining this letter that he made the journey to the Island.
