## P. E. Island Termed Land Of Opportunities For Colour-Drunk Painters

The following feature article by Carl Weisberger appeared in a recent issue of the Ottawa Citizen: CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I.—I wonder why Prince Edward Island has not become a mecca for color-drunk painters.

From the Point at Stanhope Beach, gazing across the wide, open circle of the blue bay, the fishing village, the long-stretched golden-toned sand dunes, the painter may catch an abundance of gentle "color-schemes" and compositions ready-made by Nature.

There is the warm-glowing sand, yellow, rust-red, even purple in the sunlight; stretches of silvery, pearl-grey, azure-blue waters; a vermilion-red boat; the silent whiteness of a sail against an island delicately touched with light-green grass, and brown-yellow lobster traps piled up for next year's fishing.

And this harmony and contrast of warm yellows, reds, greens and blues has the dream-like simplicity of a primitive painting by the "dour" Rousseau or the playful naivety of Grandma Moses' palette.

**Like Picture-Book**

Somewhat this whole Prince Edward Island seems to have sprung from a child's picture book. Mind you, a picture-book for good, content children who need no tall, snow-capped mountain, waterfalls, tigers, palm trees to tickle their imagination.

Prince Edward Island spells peace, patience, compromise. No wonder, Confederation was born on Prince Edward Island. A uniformed guide who speaks with a broad Scottish brogue, shows the visitors through the age-brown, venerable Provincial Building, to the historic chairs where 38 years ago the whistling delegates discussed Canadian unification.

Commonsense, compromise, composition (painterly and political) must be in the air, the gentle, mellow air of the Island.

Jacques Cartier noticed it at once when he discovered the lovely land, and as if he had attended a modern school of journalism, his first-hand "story" had the right, colorful adjectives (if you make a few allowances for style and spelling).

Translated into similarly quaint English, Jacques Cartier wrote: "All the said land is low and plaine and the fairest that may be possibly seen, full of goodly meadows and trees."

**Famous Sunsets**

If he had had more time and a sentimental picture-post-card eye, Jacques Cartier might have added the description of one of those famous sunset and moonrise combinations on the Island. The tourists never fail to gather on the lofty Point to gaze at the wondrous double phenomenon of the setting sun on one side and the rising moon on the other—a first-class tourist folder attraction included in the hotel's American plan.

Moreover, the setting sun, reflected in the sea and in the waters, separated by a flat island, appears as three suns, one on top of the other, out-shining even the two suns in that weird painting by the sun-struck, mad Van Gogh. And on the other side, around the verandah corner, one can see, at the same time, the moon rising above the pearl grey bay, as lovely and as romantic as in a song by Schubert or Brahms, the big moon casting a long silvery path across the rippling bay.

The seagulls utter their last cries. And a white, tall heron stands on one leg in the shallow water, given to calm, philosophical thoughts like Socrates. But then the mosquitoes (not included in the American plan) wake up and drive the tourists from the verandah.

**Romantic Moonlight**

The moonlight was even more romantic when the C.N.R. train at Cape Tormentine, New Brunswick, slowly, cautiously rolled onto the huge ferry boat which carried the burden of a railway train and a few dozen automobiles across the Northumberland Strait to Cape Borden, P. E. I.

At Charlottetown's Victoria Park, near big white-gleaming birch trees, stands the Government House on slender, classical columns. The garden was full of ladies assembled to a women's

conference. Not one man as far as I could see! Had I bumped into a harem by mistake? Or, like Parsifal, into a magic garden of girl-flowers? I withdrew quickly—but not quickly enough. A girl on duty at the entrance asked me, with the respectful politeness of the Islander, whether I would like to be introduced to the Governor... I, in my crumpled tourist's shirt!

Instead of this I walked up to a grassy cliff at the edge of the shore, attracted by what looked like the opposite of a women's conference: a group of early Victorian bronze cannon. (In Quebec City American housewives like to sit on such historical guns posing for Hubby's souvenir-hungry photo camera. But here, in simpler Charlottetown, the riding on 100-year-old guns, seems a somewhat odd idea.)

I merely stood and stared at the harbor, the broad sweep of green hills and red sand beaches.

**Small World**

"Could you show me Keppoch Beach?" I asked a young girl. She sat to the foot of an old two reasons. Firstly, because I wanted to know where Keppoch bronze cannon. I asked her for Beach was, and secondly, because she looked very nice and pretty. She got up instantly and tried to feed my photographic hunger. But behind her correct English stood the accent and intonation of another language—the quaint sound of Czech.

She from Prague—the daughter of the former Czechoslovakian consul-general in Paris—and I from Vienna—we met of all things at one of Queen Victoria's bronze guns at Charlottetown, P. E. I. We felt how ridiculously small the world was, far smaller than the coves and fishing harbors of Prince Edward Island.

In her rose-colored dress, the girl looked a pretty picture against the green hills and blue waters of this friendly, harmonious Island, abridging the New and the Old World, the present and the past.
