Local and Other Items

—The Princess and Northumberland are to be laid up for the winter.
 —The Princess brought over about twenty passengers and a double mail today.
 —The Natural History and Antiquarian Society will hold its meeting of the season next Monday night.
 —The temperature during the night was one above zero. This morning at 9 o'clock four above indicated.
 —The Hillsborough is keeping its track between Charlottetown and Southport open. But the Elin is not able to move out.
 —The ice in the harbor is so firm that a man walked from Southport to Charlottetown today, keeping in the vicinity of the Hillsborough's track all the way.
 —The Aberdeen came into port last night with the automatic buoys. This morning she left for Pictou, taking up the buoys at Fitzroy rock, en route.
 —The Princess left Pictou this morning at half-past eight o'clock, and reached Charlottetown about one o'clock. Captain McLean reports meeting considerable ice after passing Point Prim, the ice inside the harbor being especially heavy.

—Mr. William M. Curtis, druggist, of Boston, was yesterday re-elected Councillor for Ward 21, that city. Mr. Curtis is the third son of Mr. J. F. Curtis, of the Customs Department. His many friends in Charlottetown will be glad to hear of his success.
