

our Government; the Majority perceived it to be their *positive* duty to submit to the necessity of the case, and at once to secure the people's rights by the concession which they have made. The concession has, however, been very guardedly, as well as reluctantly, made; and the event will shew that it will not impose the slightest additional burthen upon the tenantry or the people at large.

In concluding this hasty and imperfect review of the proceedings of the Assembly for the last week, we feel much pleasure in being able to direct the attention of our readers to the promptitude with which his Excellency has responded, the very moment he felt himself at liberty to do so, to the wishes of the People, as expressed through their Representatives, both with regard to the introduction of the Responsible System, and the resumption of the Inland Mail Service; and we hail that promptitude as a very decided indication of the readiness with which his Excellency, when surrounded by a Council having the confidence of the people, will ever be found to co-operate with them for the public good.

Before our next issue of the EXAMINER, the absurd—we believe we may say unprecedented—anomalous of the public business being carried on,—as has too long been the case in our House of Assembly—not only independently of the Government, but in spite of it, will, we trust, have ceased to exist; and they who represent the Government, in that Branch of the Legislature, be found occupying their legitimate position therein as members of the majority.

POST OFFICE.

We have much pleasure in being able to direct the attention of our readers to the Documents which are inserted in other columns of this paper, by order of the Assembly, in reference to an inquiry into the suspension of the Inland Mail service during the last summer, through the malignant intervention of the late Governor. The evidence given by Mr. Owen before the special Committee establishes beyond the possibility of doubt, that the suspension of the Inland Mails was not necessarily consequent upon the refusal of the Assembly to grant the usual supplies, for that gentleman most satisfactorily proves, what we have all along asserted, that the Mails could have been continued independently of a Legislative grant; and that the loss to the revenue, and the mischievous consequences to the community, arising from the suspension of the service, is wholly and solely attributable to Sir Donald and his obstructive Council. But if any thing can prove more clearly than another the guilt of what must soon be styled "the late Government," in this transaction, it is the order which Sir Alexander Bannerman has given to the Deputy Postmaster General to resume the transmission of the Inland Mails, for no public money is set apart for that service now any more than there was last summer. Further commentary is unnecessary.

INCENDIARISM.—A diabolical attempt was made, on the night of Thursday last, to burn the house occupied by J. R. Mayne, Esq., Commander, R. N. who resides about a mile from Charlottetown, by placing a coarse bag, sewed with black thread, wrapped in a *Times* Newspaper, and tied at one end with a piece of white tape, under the sill of the house, in a state of partial combustion. Fortunately, the miscreant appears to have been disturbed and driven off by Capt. Mayne's dog, before a successful issue to the plot had been secured. Suspicion having fallen upon a female in the employment of Mr. L. White, who occupies the adjoining premises, a Warrant was issued for her apprehension, and a searching investigation into all the circumstances of the case took place on Saturday morning last, before a full Bench of Magistrates; but no evidence in any way connecting her with the offence was elicited, further than the utterance by the suspected party, on several occasions recently, of expressions of a very violent and improper character, with reference to Mr. Mayne. The prisoner was, therefore, discharged. A reward has since been offered by Capt. Mayne for the detection of the culprit, and we sincerely trust, for the credit of all parties concerned, and for the good of the community generally, that the really guilty individual will speedily be discovered and brought to punishment. Minutes of the evidence before the Magistrates, was taken at the time, but in the present state of the investigation we think it desirable to refrain from giving it publicity.
