LONDON, June 6.

A special despatch from Pesth says that the Servians will commence hostilities as soon as the Russians cross the Danube.

One of the semi-official journals of St. Petersburg says that peace depends on events on the battle-field.

Russia has invited diplomatic representatives to headquarters so that the political pulse of Europe may be felt as war proceeds.

The Russians on the Danube are suffering greatly from the intense heat.

### Telegraphic News.

MONTREAL, June 5.

The naked body of a woman was found floating opposite the city to-day. Argument in the Jacques Cartier case is going on.

The Papal Legate spent the day in visiting public and charitable institutions.

Sr. JOHN, N.B., June 5.

Mr. Townsend has arranged a race between Ross and Smith, to take place on the Kennebecasis, for three miles, on July 24th. One hundred dollars a side were put up to-day in the hands of Sheriff Harding.

Sr. PETERS, C.B., June 5.

A building occupied by Mr. Tuck, contractor, as a barn, was destroyed by fire about three o'clock this morning. Five horses, hay, harness, carriage, &c., were burnt. The building belonged to the Handley estate, and was formerly used by Handley as a ship carpenter's shop. The reason of fire is very mysterious.

MOUNT CARMEL, ILL., June 5.

A terrible storm struck this city at four o'clock yesterday afternoon, by which sixteen men lost their lives, and half a million worth of property was destroyed. A large number were wounded, several of whom will undoubtedly die. At least twenty-five are still missing.

Another despatch says that from thirty to fifty are wounded, and about seventy missing. Among the buildings destroyed are the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches, two school houses, court house and several stores and residences.

Mount Carmel was a thriving town of about three thousand inhabitants, on the Cairo and Vincennes Railroad. The most prominent buildings destroyed were the court house, two newspaper offices, three churches, one of them the finest in Southern Illinois, and two schoolhouses, and nearly a hundred residences were destroyed or damaged either by storm or by fire. The loss is estimated at three to five hundred thousand dollars. The same tornado damaged a number of buildings in

other towns lying in its pathway. At Mattoon, Ill., the residence of Willis Walkup was overturned, seriously injuring Mrs. Walkup.

KEY WEST, FLA., June 4.

The American Whaling schooner *Ellen Ripan*, of Provincetown, Mass., has arrived here. While taking oil on Keys, South of Cuba, the schooner was boarded by a Spanish cruiser, and her papers demanded under penalty of punishment. Captain Dinham produced the papers, but they were considered insufficient, and he was detained four days in close confinement until the arrival of a Spanish frigate.

LONDON, June 5.

A Vienna correspondent states that the latest advices from the Caucasus show that the insurrection in that region is spreading. The efforts of the Turks to stir up the Circassians proved successful, and the insurgents will be able to give occupation for a considerable time to a large Russian force.

A correspondent at Rostchuck says: "Despite reports published in the English journals, not a single Russian soldier has yet crossed the Danube."

Band of Circassians and Bashi Bazouks, about a hundred in number, volunteered to cross the river at Rostchuk at midnight in the face of Russian batteries, and capture Russian sentinels. They succeeded, surrounded the guard house, attacked guard and killed several Russians. Captured 150 head cattle, and took some prisoners.

Secretary Egerton, of the Admiralty, stated in the Commons to-day that nothing but a case of insubordination occurred on board flagship *Alexandria*, and there was not a mutiny.

The *Telegraph's* Bucharest correspondent reports that part of the Roumanian militia has been disbanded. The remainder will probably be dismissed within the next fortnight because of emptiness of treasury.

LONDON, June 5.

In the Commons this afternoon a despatch was laid on the table, addressed by Earl Derby to Lord Lyons, British Ambassador at Paris. Derby informs Lyons that Great Britain declined the proposal of DeLesseps to keep open Suez Canal to all nations, and had intimated to Russia that an attempt to blockade or otherwise interfere with Canal or its approaches would be regarded by England as a menace to India, and a grave injury to commerce of the world incompatible with maintenance of British attitude of passive neutrality. At the same time it was intimated to the Porte and the Khedive that England was firmly determined not to permit the Canal to be made the scene of any combat or other warlike operations.

In the Commons this afternoon Secretary Bourke stated that Russia had agreed to observe the maritime declarations of the Treaty of Paris, both as regards the powers directly interested, and also with reference to Spain and America. He said the powers had never asked nor given any opinion with reference to Derby's reply to Gortschakoff's circular.

There was a battle to-day near Maljat, lasting several hours. The Turks were defeated, and lost 500 men. Montenegrin losses not ascertained.

A Calcutta despatch says South West Monsoon burst at Columbus, Ceylon, on the 14th of last month, and is expected at Bombay early in June. If it brings sufficient rain, the Government will be able to congratulate itself on having passed the crisis of the famine.

A despatch from Vienna says Porte, as a precaution against growing war agitation in Greece, has ordered calling out of militia and reserves in Epirus and Thessaly, and distribution of arms among the population of frontier districts.

BERLIN, June 5.

Statements that Governments of England, Germany and Spain have come to an understanding in respect to taxation of British and German subjects in Cuba is not incorrect. Germany and England have objected to any war tax at all.

COPENHAGEN, June 5.

Anniversary of Granting of Constitution is being celebrated. A crowd of 20,000 persons are marching through the streets. Owing to political feeling precautions have been taken against riotous demonstrations before King's residence.
