Mr. Frank Lappin, locomotive fireman, on behalf of the group presented Mr. Moore with a Buren automatic wrist watch. Conservative Resolution Urges Action To Protect Domestic Potato Market

Action by both the Federal and Provincial Governments to take "necessary and immediate steps to protect our domestic market for potatoes and other farm products so as to relieve the serious situation which exists today" was demanded in a resolution passed at the annual meeting of the Provincial Progressive Conservative Association here yesterday.

The resolution noted that the farmers of this Province "are today receiving the lowest prices for many years for their potatoes and other products," and stated that no action had been taken by either government to remedy the situation.

Another resolution expressed regret that nothing had been accomplished at the recent Dominion-Provincial Conference at Ottawa and "that our Provincial presentation failed completely so far as making any impression on the Prime Minister in regard to our fiscal needs and special claims". It expressed disapproval "at the lack of preparation and initiative displayed by Premier Matheson and his associates while attending this very important conference," and at the attitude of Prime Minister St. Laurent had taken in regard to our needs.

Other resolutions affirmed the organization's loyalty and devotion to Her Majesty the Queen; expressed confidence in the Federal leader, Hon. George Drew, and tendered deep sympathy to the family of the late Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, former long-term Member of Parliament for Queens.

charged that the Federal Government did not realize the position of the Maritime Provinces. At its rate it was giving "a deaf ear" to all our pleadings".

The Federal-Provincial Conference recently concluded was tarnished as a fiasco by the Conservative leader who also dealt critically with Premier Matheson's pre-election assurances regarding the establishment of a \$10,000,000 processing plant here. He said the Northern lands which had been thought worthless were producing billions and the benefits therefrom were being reaped by the Central and Western Provinces while the Maritimes which were entitled to their share of this development got nothing.
