She sails on return about six o'clock this evening with a cargo of 1800 cases lobsters for London, a large quantity of oats and some general merchandise.

THE officers of the French warship Minerve, which recently visited this port, gave a brilliant reception on board ship at Montreal on Tuesday. Hundreds of the leading citizens were present. The ship's band furnished the music for dancing. The officers of the local regiments, on their arrival, were received with a salute fired in their honor. General Middleton received an official welcome, 17 guns being fired in his honor.

THE Educational Associations of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have unanimously agreed to recommend an inter-provincial convention for the three provinces. P. E. THE RED RIVER RAILWAY.

MORE BREAKERS AHEAD

WINNIPEG, MAN., Aug. 24.

Another injunction was served upon the Red River Railway enterprise this morning, this time on behalf of a settler named Jenkins, who has already given considerable trouble, and who refused to accept the amount offered him for the right of way, on the ground that the sum was not sufficient.

Two bills of complaint have been filed in the office of the registrar at the Court House in behalf of Sir Donald A. Smith to prohibit the Red River Valley Road from crossing his property at St. Norbert.

They are similar to one filed on Saturday by a man named Browning, except that they ask that the matter be referred to the Master in Equity to take action of the damages, loss and injury which the plaintiff has sustained by reason of the act of the defendant in constructing a railroad through his land and that they have to pay the same there is no doubt. That should the court decide against Browning and his injunction, the matter of which is set for two weeks hence, other injunctions will be applied for.

The Line at Morris is being guarded by special provincial constables.

The first consignment of material for ironing the Red River Road arrived to-day. In an interview to-day, Attorney-General Hamilton said if the emergency demanded it, the Legislature would immediately be called together.

The Disallowance Question.

EXCITEMENT IN LONDON.

LONDON, Aug. 24.

A cable published here this afternoon, attributing to Sir John Macdonald a statement that Imperial troops were demanded for the suppression of army resistance in Manitoba to the disallowance question, is exciting considerable attention. The statement is wholly discredited in well informed Canadian quarters. Nevertheless it is calculated to cause mischief among the British public generally. The impression here still is that Manitoba will triumph if she is careful to keep within constitutional limits.

Rioting Renewed.

OSTEND, Aug. 24.

Rioting was renewed to-day. In endeavoring to quell the disturbance the authorities resorted to the use of artillery, killing two and wounding four seriously. The civic guards have suppressed by military detachments who have taken possession of the Quays. A proclamation has been issued forbidding the assembling of crowds.

Proclamation Defied.

DUBLIN, Aug. 24.

The Ennis Board of Guardians have adopted an official resolution defying the government's proclamation against the National League, and expecting all Board of Guardians to advance the principles of the League.

The Porte Disapproves.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 24.

The Porte has telegraphed Ferdinand that it disapproves of his entry into Bulgaria without the sanction of the Porte and Powers.
