MEETING AT PLEASANT VALLEY.

Prospects Good for Martin and McLean all Along the Line.

The political meeting at Pleasant Valley was another successful one for Messrs. Martin and McLean. Hon. Mr. Forbes said very little, and H. C. McDonald got completely bewildered, when he raised his hand and exhibited a little pamphlet, saying, "This is the speech of Hector C. McDonald, and I am proud of it; and I, myself, paid for printing it." One of the electors replied, "No one in the world would pay a cent for it but yourself."

MEETING AT BEAR RIVER.

The meeting at Bear River North, with Mr. James R. Macdonald in the chair, was a very orderly one, and every speaker got a good hearing. No secretary was appointed. The four candidates, Mr. John McLean, M. P., and others spoke. The most noteworthy feature of the discussion was the clear, level-headed way in which the Opposition speakers presented their arguments, whilst those on the Government side wandered from the subject at issue, as usual.

It was a decided success for the Conservatives; and although a grid-district, the Opposition candidates will poll a larger Conservative vote there on the 13th of December than ever was done before. The mist of gritism is slowly but surely clearing away from Bear River. So note it be.

MEETING AT MURRAY RIVER.

A public meeting was held at Murray River last evening. There was a large attendance. Mr. Robert Whitehead occupied the chair. Speeches were made by the candidates, and by Messrs. A. P. Prowse and John Livingston. The Opposition candidates, Clow and McLeod, were warmly received. Dr. Robertson was present with a side-pot-gun, which, after making a speech, left the meeting. Murray River has hitherto been considered a grid-district, but it will give a better account of itself this election. At least two-thirds of those present at the meeting last night were supporters of the Opposition.
