



**RESCUED CARPENTER REACHES HOSPITAL**

**Tuna Fishing Experiment Proves Successful In N.B.**

FREDERICTON (CP)—New Brunswick's commercial tuna fishing experiment has been successful so far and will be continued this year. "We and the fishermen are quite happy and believe there's a big potential in waters off the United States and Canada," said Deputy Fisheries Minister Leonce Chenard in commenting on results last summer and fall—second season for the venture. The 1964 catches by two specially-built vessels exceeded 1,000 tons worth more than \$154,000. In the brief first season of 1963, when only one vessel was ready to start the experiment, 350 tons returned \$46,800. Campobello Island fishermen and the newly created provin-

cial fisheries department began the project jointly, to supplement the Bay of Fundy sardine and herring fishery. Tuna operations off the east coast were found possible in summer and early fall. The two steel-hulled trawler-seiner vessels, designed for multi-purpose fishing, cost \$350,000 each. When not purse-seining for tuna, they go after herring and similar species and also drag for groundfish. Fishermen operators made down payments of 10 per cent of the total cost after each of the two operating groups borrowed \$140,000 from the New Brunswick fishermen's loan board at four per cent interest and to be repaid over a 15-year period. Remainder of the cost was borne by the federal government under its shipbuilding subsidy program. The 91-foot vessels can hold about 300,000 pounds of brine-refrigerated fish. In the past two seasons they began tuna-fishing off the U.S. coast in late spring, following the bluefins north and close to the Bay of Fundy. A market was assured at Eastport, Me.

**BACKWOODS DRAWS SPARK**

OTTAWA (CP)—The Commons was told in no uncertain terms that hockey star Bobby Hull does not come from "the backwoods of Ontario." Looking indignant, Douglas Alkenbrack (PC—Prince Edward-Lennox) rose on a question of privilege to protest a "scurrilous article" in Time magazine reporting that Chicago Black Hawks' prolific scorer comes from Prince Edward-Lennox, "the backwoods of Ontario." Mr. Alkenbrack, who lists himself as co-founder of a lumber company at Napanee, said he is proud to have Hull as a constituent and denied the Bay of Quinte district where Hull was born is a backwoods. "The Bay of Quinte district is the oldest civilized and settled area in Ontario—older than Chicago," he said amid laughter. Speaker Alan Macnaughton, a Westmount, Que., lawyer, cut him off by saying there was no question of privilege involved.

**Dual Identity Man Hopeful Can Continue**

OMAHA, Neb. (AP)—John F. (Fritz) Johnson, central figure in a dual identity case, said here he hopes to continue his career as an Omaha television announcer. He said he went back to work Thursday. Appearing at a brief press conference, Johnson said recent medical tests confirmed what he had known all along—that "I have no recollection of any life as Larry Bader." Johnson has been identified as Bader, an Akron, Ohio, man who disappeared in 1957 during a Lake Erie fishing trip. Johnson said his lawyer, Harry Farnham, had assured him "there is no doubt in my mind I am Larry Bader." As for future ramifications, Johnson said: "I can't comprehend them all." He said he intended to take things one at a time, day by day. The press conference was held in the office of his lawyer, who had asked that questions be submitted in advance. Lawyer Farnham later told reporters Johnson's wife, Nancy had a bad cold and for that reason did not appear with her husband. Farnham said Nancy would meet with reporters herself in the near future. Bader also was married and the father of four children.
