

S'ide Convention Ends With Audio-Visual Talks

Some 160 persons attended the second session of the Summer-side local Teacher's convention in Civic Auditorium yesterday. The first address of the day was made to the convention by Stan MacInnis, director of visual education for P.E.I.

Mr. MacInnis told what audio-visual aids are, how they can be used to the greatest advantage in the classroom, especially in rural areas. He traced the use of pictures as a tool for communicating ideas from earliest times to the present day. He demonstrated the various uses of a flannel board and the versatility of film strips over motion pictures in some cases.

The president of the P.E.I. Teacher's Federation, Miss Mabel Matheson, reminded the teachers that these two days of convention are very important ones and hoped that they would be helpful to all teachers. On behalf of the Teacher's Federation she welcomed the beginning teachers into the profession, and said, "there is no vocation to which I would rather belong or be privileged to work in with my whole heart, and I hope you feel the same".

She explained the purpose and "doings" of the World Council of the teaching profession, and said that teachers are all members through membership in the Canadian Teachers Federation and the local P.E.I. Teachers Federation. "We must not simply ask for prestige, but rather win it," she said.

As good teachers the first duty is to always remember the wants and needs of the individual pupil, she said.

Miss Matheson encouraged teachers to constantly improve their academics and professional status.

RESOLUTIONS
Norman MacDonald, chairman of the resolutions committee, brought in the following resolutions:

(1) Whereas, if Grade X pupils are weak in either algebra or geometry, they are sometimes inclined to concentrate on one at the expense of the other. Therefore, be it resolved that either algebra and geometry be made separate papers in the provincial examination, or that the Board of Education require that pupils make a minimum of 20 out of 50 in each subject.

(2) Resolved that we express our appreciation to the Board of Education for giving teachers extra remuneration for additional university credits up to the first year level. Be it further resolved that consideration be given to continuing this program for successive years of credits at university up to the post graduate level.

(3) Whereas a lump sum of income tax deduction in April makes things difficult for teachers from a financial standpoint, be it resolved that deductions for income tax be made from the monthly cheques of all teachers.

(4) Whereas the minimum number of teaching days in a school year is believed to be not more than 195 in other Provinces, be it resolved that the 200 days minimum on P.E.I. be reduced to at most 195.

(5) Whereas there has been some discrepancies in the questions of the entrance examinations in the past, and whereas there is an examining board for grades XI and XII in this province at the present time, be it resolved that this convention go on record as favoring the setting up of an examining board for Grade X in this province.

(6) Be it resolved that the thanks of our convention be extended to the Town of Summerside for the use of Civic Auditorium; the various speakers for their helpful addresses; and the out going executive for the efficient way they organized and carried out the convention program.

During the lunch hour an executive meeting was held to complete plans for a proposed winter course to be held in Summerside High School.

The purpose of such a course is to further the academic standings of interested teachers. The chairman was Clarence Mercer.

AFTERNOON
The afternoon session opened with a lively sing song directed by John Leuty and Gabriel Chaisson, with Mrs. Enid Birch as pianist.

Mr. Moore, the president, then introduced Miss Estelle Bowness, General Secretary of the P.E.I. T.F.

Miss Bowness inquired, "Should we as teachers embark on a teacher recruitment project", or should this be done by a committee? "Are we as teachers able to answer any question concerning education in the Province or the Dominion," she asked?

She noted the increased interest in education week and teachers' Easter convention, and commended the teachers for it. A letter of farewell written by Dr. L.W. Shaw was read, thanking the teachers for their co-operation during his term of office.

Miss Bowness said the P.E.I. educational conference in November will be an important event in the life of every teacher. She told the teachers not to put too low a price tag on their ability, remembering that they are doing the most important job on earth.

Mr. Moore introduced Millar MacFadyen, attendance officer with the Department of Education. Mr. MacFadyen reminded the teachers of the change in percentage of attendance of pupils which is now 85 percent of days in which school is in operation, and 90 percent for Summerside and Charlottetown, and other larger centres.

He said that correspondence courses were available to permit teachers, one room schools, for grades 9 and 10, and for those teachers who have just returned to the profession.

Mt. Pleasant Man, 106, Believed Oldest Citizen

Arthur Wright of Mount Pleasant, whose age is said to be 106 years, is probably the oldest citizen in Prince Edward Island, and undoubtedly is the oldest registered in the current tuberculosis and x-ray survey being conducted in this Province.

At an unprecedented event on Monday evening, when ages varied to the extent of 100 years, Mr. Wright, 106, his wife, age 85, and their 6-year old great grandson Miles Walfield, received cards acknowledging their negative reaction to the tuberculosis tests at the clinic in Mount Pleasant School.

Mr. Wright came to Prince Edward Island from England when a young boy, and has resided here since that time, first on the Kelly Road in the O'Leary area, and later, following the death of his first wife, moved to Mount Pleasant district after his remarriage to a Portage widow, Mrs. Georgina MacArthur, more than 20 years ago.

His only son, Ira Wright, resides in Summerside, and is said to be 64 years of age.

AGE ACCEPTED
The year of Mr. Wright's birth in England 106 years ago, is said to have been established by correspondence with officials in that country, and has been accepted by Governmental departments in Canada.

Considering his age, the health and physical condition of this remarkable man is amazing. His speech, hearing, sight and walking ability are favorably comparable to a man 25 years younger, and he is said to have never required a doctor or dentist, and to still retain most of his natural teeth.

Despite the advanced years, Mr. and Mrs. Wright reside by themselves and do practically all their own housework and chores around the home, but are visited daily by Mrs. Wright's daughter, Mrs. Alfred Essery, who lives nearby.

Still maintaining a great interest in community, provincial, and international events, Mr. Wright has been a Guardian subscriber during much of his long residence in Prince Edward Island, and his active participation in local progress is evidenced by his interest and attendance at the tuberculosis survey clinic held in his own district.

Since these tuberculosis testing and x-ray survey clinics were commenced in 1956 most of the Island has been surveyed.

This year the clinics have covered 19 larger centers which included 174 school districts, and approximately 18,000 persons tested, with the Mount Pleasant district establishing the 'clinic's new age slogan "from 6 to 106".

MAGISTRATE ISSUES CRACKDOWN NOTICE ON DRUNKEN DRIVING

SUMMERSIDE — Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C., issued a notice of a crackdown on drunken driving in Magistrate's Court here Tuesday morning.

Magistrate Hinton said that henceforth in the Summerside court the alternative sentence to a conviction of impaired driving will be 14 days instead of seven.

The present mandatory sentence for an intoxicated charge is a minimum of seven days with no chance to pay a fine. It will also be increased to 14 days.

On the docket facing Magistrate Hinton, three Summerside residents pleading guilty of being intoxicated in a public place were each fined \$20 and costs.

The case of a Summerside man charged with possession of a large quantity of illicit spirits was further adjourned to September 22nd.

A Montreal man, employed at the RCAF Station, pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of impaired driving and was fined \$100 and costs.

An O'Leary man appearing on a reduced impaired driving charge was also fined \$100 and costs.

A Tignish man pleaded not guilty to a charge of driving a motor vehicle while intoxicated. His case was adjourned to September 23rd.

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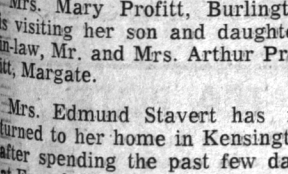
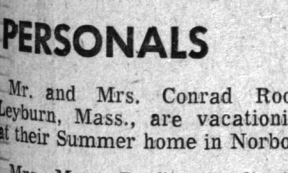
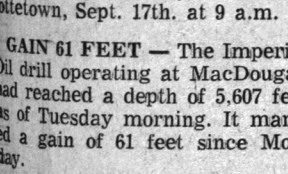
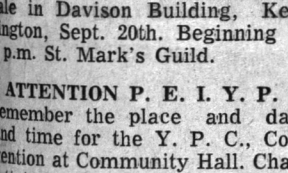
