Liberal Women Continue Session

OTTAWA (CP) — The National Federation of Liberal Women Wednesday night said Liberal women's clubs had approved the principle of equal pay for equal work in 1947, and objected to a statement that the principle had been implemented through efforts of organizations outside the federation.

A release made available to the press following a closed session of the NFLW convention here did not indicate to what statement or which organizations the discussion referred.

The release said Liberal women's clubs had approved the equal pay principle by resolution in 1947. It also stated the clubs supported the Liberal administration "in its efforts to implement this principle by the example provided in a recent ruling that there shall be equal pay for equal work in all institutions under federal jurisdiction."

The government's equal-pay-for-women bill was announced in the throne speech in January. The resolution has not yet been debated in the Commons.

Britain's Automation Strike Has Completed Its First Week

COVENTRY, Eng. (Reuters)—Britain's first "automation strike" ended its first week Wednesday and a concerned press reported extensively on its significance.

Some 11,000 Standard Motor workers are striking because 3,500 of them will be laid off during installation of automation machinery. The company is spending £4,000,000 on retooling at the tractor plant it operates for Massey-Harris-Ferguson.

The strikers contend that layoffs should be avoided by sharing available work through a shorter-time basis. They also fear that the "thinking machines" will cost some of the 3,500 their jobs.

The strike is unofficial—the strikers cannot draw strike pay—but moves are being made to win the formal backing of unions concerned.

The Conservative paper Daily Telegraph says in its front-page report that "employers and trade union chiefs" are convinced there is a direct link between the strike

and the Communist party's policy on automation.

In an editorial, the paper declares: "It has to be said that the right to stay in the same job is another; that some temporary employment is inevitable as the revolution in industry gathers pace; that Communist agitation in our main industries is completely irresponsible; and that the nation cannot afford strikes which bring important exports to a standstill."

The left-wing, mass-circulation Daily Mirror says in a full-page editorial: "This is the first big strike of the robot revolution."

"Communist influence aside, it is a strike that has been fomented by a fear of the push-button age."

The Labor party organ Daily Herald says in an editorial that the chief blame for the automation woes rests on the Conservative government.

"For the blunt fact is that this is a government with no plan to meet the age of automation. It has been warned. But nothing is ready."
