Thoughts For Our Time

One of the many evils engendered by the wars of this half century has been an erroneous conception of peace. Perhaps the urgency of war may demand the adoption of slogans and half-truths; but having heard so frequently of war that would end all war, and of war that would make the world safe for democracy, we began to look on peace as a time when by some unknown process the world would become a blissful paradise in which evil, and especially war, would cease to exist. The strenuous activity and self-sacrifice of war was seen as a necessity demanded by the unusual situation of the moment. Peace would mean the possibility of return to a life in which desires might be satisfied to a life of pleasing and restful selfishness. But the peace we knew in the interlude between the wars and the situation we know today is anything but the ideal which we often allowed ourselves to accept. For us of the twentieth century the question of war is no longer a speculative question; we live in an age where war is never declared, yet where war never stops. Instead of the anticipated goodness, and order of our homeland, we have seen, in recent investigations, the extent of the moral corruption that is gnawing at the

... liberal or the Marxist of today. That notion has been perfectly refuted by Saint Augustine, in words that cannot be quoted too often: "Thou hast made us for Thyself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in Thee." Man must realize that his perfect peace is in God and there alone. Such an attitude does not imply despair of a practical solution of the problems of the world; it is simply a realization that no solution is final. The problem of each era of man's history must find its appropriate answer. There will be no universal answer, since each period has special problems. But there will be a common purpose: the production in every age of the conditions which will foster justice and harmony in the lives of nations and of individuals. It is essential to remember that peace is the result of charity, not of justice. Justice removes the hind-

The other reaction falls likewise to go to the heart of the problem. Its followers—and the number is increasing—see the corruption of the world as something too deeply rooted to allow any possibility of cure. There have been and there always will be wars. To think otherwise is to be unrealistic. As a consequence they seek to make the most out of the existing circumstances. They strive to build world peace upon economic theories and they place their confidence for the solution of all immediate difficulties in the power of science. Either view is deadly, for to ignore the weakness of our society is actually to destroy it. We have accepted an idea of peace based on the notion of the natural perfection of man. We have sought an earthly paradise of complete and effortless satisfaction. In its place, we must accept a view of man and society that is based on reality. First of all, we must remember that the evil in man and nations that causes war, remains in time of peace, and must be controlled by continued and tireless effort. A true peace is not the mathematical result of a proportion of strength, nor is it a time of relaxation, but, in its ultimate and deepest significance, loyalty to Jesus Christ and His commandments. This is the only way in which an orderly and tranquil common life may be attained. Next we must remember what we seek in peace. Not the earthly paradise of the nineteenth cen-
