The General will speak on Wednesday night at 8 o'clock in the First Methodist Church on the spiritual and sociological work of the Army. He will arrive here in the St. Lawrence on Wednesday evening, and will speak on the Post Office Square at 7.30 p. m. that day. The General will speak one night only in Charlottetown. He leaves next morning for the west.
