New Council Digs In On Immediate Business

GEORGETOWN — The first meeting of the new Georgetown Town Council was held in the council chambers Monday night with Mayor Howard S. MacLean presiding and a full slate of councillors in attendance.

Six committees were appointed: finance; chairman, J. W. Lavers, James G. McConnell and Mrs. Joan Currie; police and sanitation; chairman, Joseph E. Johnson, Malcolm MacLean, James G. McConnell; public property; chairman, James G. McConnell, John P. MacDonald, Malcolm MacLean; fire hall and fire equipment; chairman, John P. MacDonald, Mrs. Joan Currie and J.W. Lavers; streets and sidewalks; chairman, Malcolm MacLean, Joseph E. Johnson; and John P. MacDonald; welfare and street lights; chairman, Mrs. Joan Currie, J.W. Lavers, and Joseph E. Johnson.

Councillor J.W. Lavers was appointed deputy mayor. Mayor MacLean asked that at each regular meeting the chairman of each committee submit a written report, books for this purpose were provided and each committee chairman prepare his report in duplicate.

The financial statement for the month of January was read by Coun. Lavers. It showed receipts of \$1,991.10 and expenditures of \$3,426.04. Chief item in the expenditure was the sum of \$2,131 paid Matheson and MacMillan for paving a portion of Water Street leading to Bathurst Marine Limited.

Included in the receipts was the amount of \$1,278.60 received from the provincial government as its 60 per cent share of the cost of this paving project. This work was done in the fall of 1964 but did not show on the town's annual financial statement.

AMOUNT NOT INCLUDED

The costs of stabilizing the portion of Water Street that was paved and of placing a culvert on this section, necessary before paving, amounted to \$359.89 and this amount had not been included in the amount of the cost of the project by the former Council, and therefore the 60 per cent government refund was not forthcoming on this amount. The council adopted a motion to apply to the government for its usual grant on this amount.

The financial statement showed a Jan. 31 balance of \$3,347.66.

The council, on motion, decided that application would be made to the P.E.I. Industrial Corporation for reimbursement of the amount spent by the town in 1963 and 1964 in purchasing the site where Bathurst

The matter of requests of commercial enterprises desirous of leasing or buying portions of Kent Square, if legally possible, came up for discussion, and on this matter the council decided that with the prospect of growth and population expansion for Georgetown in the immediate future that Kent Square should be preserved for future development as a town park.

The report of the water and sewage survey made by Canadian-British Engineering Consultants was received by the council and will be a subject for study. The necessity of this survey, instituted by the former council, was questioned by Coun. Lavers, as many aspects of the survey were available from the survey done by Laurie A. Coles Associated for Atlantic Development Board.

NO ESTIMATE

It was pointed out that no estimate of the costs to the town of the survey conducted by Canadian-British firm was entered into at the time it was engaged to conduct the survey.

Matters relating to the town dump came up for discussion and it was stated that recent dumping of various materials on the dump roadway has blocked the entrance to the dump. This has been cleared away and a policy regarding regulations governing the dump will be one of the matters that will receive the council's consideration at an early meeting.

Many other matters came up for discussion as this being the first meeting of the new council there were many questions of civic administration, as well as standing commitments and contracts in which the town is involved.

Due to the great many matters requiring immediate study and attention the meeting was adjourned to meet again Monday, Feb. 15.

Minor Damage In Train-Car Collision

Francis Michael MacPhee of Selkirk escaped injury last evening when the 1955 model car he was driving collided with a train on the Allen Street crossing in Parkdale.

The car received an estimated \$300 damage.

The accident occurred at 8.15 p.m. when Mr. MacPhee was proceeding east on Allen Street. He said he failed to see or hear the train until he was close to the track and after applying his brakes, skidded on ice into the second engine of the train.

The train, travelling north, was bound for Borden. Engineer was Emmett Deighen.

The accident was investigated by Charlottetown RCMP detachment.
