ISLANDER DEAD—A telegram has been received by Mr. W. E. Smith of Pownal informing him of the sudden death in Regina on May 10th of his brother-in-law, Mr. Samuel J. Jardine. Mr. Jardine was a former resident of Pownal and is very well known by the people of that vicinity. His remains are being brought east accompanied by his sister, Elizabeth, for interment in Pownal cemetery.

PREMIER LEAVES FOR OTTAWA—Premier Thane A. Campbell left here Saturday for Ottawa to confer with Federal government officials. He is expected to seek re-consideration by Dominion authorities of Charlottetown's street work project which had been suggested as a relief scheme for local unemployed but which was turned down. During Hon. Mr. Campbell's absence, Minister of Public Works, Hon. J. P. McIntyre will be acting premier.

IMPRESSIVE ADDRESS ON NATIONAL RED CROSS APPEAL—Appeals for support of the Dominion-wide Red Cross campaign about to be launched were made on Thursday and Saturday evenings of last week by Hon. C. G. Power, Minister of Pensions and National Health, Ottawa, and by Mr. Norman Sommerville, K.C., of Toronto, chairman of the Central Council of the Canadian Red Cross. The former referred especially to the splendid service rendered by the Canadian Red Cross to returned men and their families while the latter made a strong plea to members of the Red Cross everywhere to rejoin themselves and enlist others in this organization which belongs to its supporters—the public.

MacFadyen, chairman of the religious work committee of the Y. M. C. A. spoke briefly at last evening's service, complimenting the S. C. He also expressed appreciation and thanks to the churches in which the services were held, to the speakers and choirs for their valuable assistance. West Indies Business Better Is View Of Charlottetown Man

Business was definitely on the up-grade in the British West Indies, Mr. Walter Hyndman, who returned last week from a two months visit to the West Indies, said during the weekend. The "Lady" boats operating on the Canada-West Indies service were crowded with both passengers and freight. There was also a good deal of traffic between the various islands, Mr. Hyndman said.

He saw in the Islands the possibility of an increased market for potatoes from here. Formerly many of the tubers used in the Islands were imported from England and Holland.

Mr. Hyndman called at all the principal West Indies Islands and also at Bermuda and British Guiana. One month of his stay in the south he was the guest of his brother-in-law, Mr. Charles Shannon, St. Lucia.

The beautiful weather in the Islands was one of the things that impressed him, Mr. Hyndman said. All the time he was south the temperature was between 80 and 85.

In Memoriam

MR. EDWIN PAYNTER

In the death of Mr. Edwin Paynter, which occurred after a brief illness last Friday morning, May 8th at the home of his son-in-law, Mr. Burrows Mose, Kensington, this community has lost one of its oldest and most highly respected citizens. He was the youngest and last surviving member of a family of eight, and his passing, after a long full life time of 82 years, removes another link with the past, with the early days and those heroic souls who have gone before— which cannot be replaced. Living the greater part of his life in Burlington, where he was a successful farmer of that place, some fifteen years ago he retired, and with Mrs. Paynter came to Kensington, to spend his declining years with his daughter, Mrs. Mose.

Last fall he and his beloved wife celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary together, when a great many relatives and friends gathered to pay their respects and do them honor, and he was heard to mention that he hoped to live to celebrate their 60th anniversary. But it was not to be. His life work was ended, he was ready for the reward of higher service, the "Well done, good and faithful servant" of his Master came to him with a clear call, and peacefully, trustingly he entered "into the joy of his Lord."

He leaves to mourn, besides a sorrowing wife, one daughter, Mrs. Burrows Mose, of Kensington, and one son, Nelson, on the home stead, Burlington. Another son, Albert Harold, predeceased him twenty years ago.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon, May 10th. A short private service was held at the home in Kensington, for the bereaved family, after which the remains were conveyed to St. Stephen's Anglican Church, Burlington, where a public service was held, conducted by the Rev. Father Nelson, on the home stead, Burlington. Another son, Albert Harold, predeceased him twenty years ago.

During the course of his address the Rector made fitting reference

to the departed, paying just tribute to his fine qualities of heart and mind.

But it was from Isaiah 60:20, "Thy sun shall no more go down; neither shall thy moon withdraw itself; for the Lord shall be thine everlasting light, and the days of thy mourning shall be ended."

"To the Christian, death is but the opening of a door, the passing on into a fuller, richer, higher form of life, and thy God thy glory." and in the passing of this righteous man, we believe that for his life of faith and service here, a life that greatly rejoiced in the Lord, that time of fulfillment has come.

Mr. Paynter was a life long member of the Anglican Church, and a member of the Executive Committee for forty years, and in his passing this church has suffered an irreplaceable loss. His optimism, his cheerful, happy smile, endeared him alike to young and old. Ever ready to do a kindness, his first thoughts and activities were for his church and in its service he found deepest joy.

"And I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, write, blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them." The pall bearers were Messrs. William Paynter, Hedley Paynter, Bruce Paynter, Chelmsford MacLeod, Aquilla Bowman, Alexander Henry. Interment was in St. Stephen's Church Cemetery, Burlington.—B

Gold Weather Delays Seeding Operations In P.E.I.

Prince Edward Island farmers and fishermen were in a dismal mood last night. Freezing weekend weather which brought a light snowfall to the province shattered farmers' hopes of being able to start planting this week, while the dirty weather had robbed the island fishermen of expected plentiful catches.

Charlottetown experimental station announced last night the temperature had fallen to 32 Saturday evening. Last night it was at the 40 mark. The Experimental Farm officials admitted the season was "backward" despite extraordinarily early advent of spring.

An early crop of wheat was sown by many farmers April 20 but no seed had been put into the ground since.

Cold weather had also held up lobster fishing in the province as temperatures were generally below the average mark of previous seasons. Rain and storms kept the lobster fishermen away from their traps and catches have been small.

Last night it was slightly warmer but there was no indication of fair weather for the start of the new week.

There are thinkers who see life as something fortuitous and unplanned. Others see it as meaningless, beginning with mystery and ending with oblivion, while we look upon it as created, planned and eternal under the guidance of Almighty Providence. "Is there a faith which we can accept as fundamental? Such we can discover in the life of Jesus, who with undoubting, confident assurance believed in God, father of all, knowing all things, sustaining all things, bringing all men into judgment. "The things of the Father" include purity, prayer, love, service, sacrifice, which should be the expression of the lives that are given to Jesus as Master and Lord. In these things of my Father he was able to say in his early ministry "I and my Father are one" and at the close of his earthly life with perfect certainty "Father, into Thy hands I commend my spirit."

The interesting sermon of the evening was "The man who found himself." The morning anthem was "O taste and see how gracious the Lord is," and the evening Wordward's "The splendours of Thy glory."
