## Liston TKO's Dejohn In 6th

**MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)**—Bull-shouldered Charles (Sonny) Liston of Philadelphia, added Mike Dejohn of Syracuse, N.Y., to his list of victims Wednesday night with a technical knockout in 2:43 of the sixth round.

Liston, weighing 209½ pounds, used a left jab to the face to advantage and piled up points early in the nationally televised fight. Then he opened up in the fifth and sixth rounds, hammering Dejohn's head and body with left hooks and right crosses.

Dejohn took the mandatory eight count in the sixth after Liston drove him around the ring with a series of left jabs and hard rights to the head. Dejohn was bleeding from the nose and his eye was purple when the fight ended. Dejohn took another count at the finish before referee Jimmy Peerless stopped it.

Dejohn, who weighed 202, appeared to be waiting for an opening that never came.

Peerless had Dejohn ahead through the fifth round but the two judges, Eddie Thal and Fred Aaronson had Liston in front. Aaronson had Liston leading 50-46 and Thal saw it 49-48

for Liston up to the fatal sixth. The Associated Press had Liston ahead, 49-47.

**Mac's Shade Finns 3-1**

**HELSINKI, Finland (CP)**—Canada's Belleville team, continuing its wump for the world hockey championships, defeated the Finnish national team 3-1 Wednesday night in a rough contest.

It was the fourth match for the Canadians in five days and they appeared a bit tired.

Defenceman Al Dewsbury, a towering six-foot three inches, was banished in the second period for menacing the referee.

A free-for-all threatened in the period when one of the Canadian players was pelted with snowballs by a gang of Finnish boys when he received a penalty.

The match was halted for five minutes until order was restored. Fans became furious when the players shooed the boys away with his stick.

# N. Ontario Keeps Pace With Alberta Foursome

**CALGARY (CP)**—Northern Ontario came back in the last four ends Wednesday afternoon to defeat Manitoba 8-6 in the fifth round of the Canadian high school curling championships and keep pace with front-running Alberta.

Each rink has four wins, but Alberta has played one game less than the Northern Ontario foursome which lost a game in the opening round of the tournament.

In other fifth-round action Quebec defeated Newfoundland 15-5, Saskatchewan downed British Columbia 13-7, Ontario edged Prince Edward Island 8-6 and Nova Scotia trounced New Brunswick 13-6.

The results leave Ontario in third spot with a 3-1 record, closely followed by New Brunswick and Quebec with three wins

in five games. Nova Scotia has two wins in four games.

**NEWFOUNDLAND WINLESS**—Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island are 2-3 followed by Manitoba with one win in four games, British Columbia one in five and Newfoundland winless in four.

Manitoba led 5-4 after six ends but Northern Ontario recovered with singles in the seventh and eighth and two in the ninth.

Manitoba jumped into a 1-0 lead after the first end. Northern Ontario replied with two in the second after Manitoba skip Jack Hellemund missed an open take-out and Northern Ontario laid its last rock in for the second point.

Manitoba tied it up in the third when Hellemund got in behind a Northern Ontario guard for shot rock. In the fourth Northern Ontario missed by an inch taking out Manitoba's best rock and Manitoba posted a big three to take the lead.

**STAYS AFTER TAKEOUT**—Northern Ontario recovered with two in the fifth when skip Tom Tod stayed after taking out Manitoba's rock with his last shot. The sixth was a dead end when Hellemund's last shot followed the Northern Ontario rock out of the house.

Saskatchewan made its best showing of the tournament when it went into an early lead against British Columbia, adding to it with a five-ender in the sixth.

Quebec, winless in its first two starts, made its best showing in the Newfoundland game.

Nova Scotia started early with a three-ender in the first and another in the fourth against New Brunswick.

Sixth round games were to start at 11 p.m. AST.

The schedule in that round was Prince Edward Island vs Nova Scotia, British Columbia vs Manitoba, Newfoundland vs Northern Ontario, Quebec vs Alberta, and Ontario vs Saskatchewan. New Brunswick got the bye.

## Chicago Black Hawks Tips Fiery Phil's Rangers 4-2

**CHICAGO (AP)**—Chicago Black Hawks scored twice in the third period and handed New York Rangers their sixth consecutive National Hockey League loss by a 4-2 score here Wednesday night.

Reserve centre Phil Maloney paced the Hawks' attack with a pair of goals, his first scores of the season. The 31-year-old centre hadn't been dressing for recent games.

The other Chicago scorers were Earl Balfour and Tod Sloan.

The victory moved the Hawks three points ahead of Boston in the race for second place and seven points ahead of fourth-place New York.

**EARLY LEAD**—Maloney and Balfour gave the Hawks a 2-0 lead in the first period, but the Rangers bounced back in the second on tallies by Andy Bathgate and Dean Prentice.

Bathgate's goal, his 30th of the year, gave him a two-point edge over Chicago's Ed Litzenberger and Montreal's Bernie Geoffrion in the scoring race. Bathgate

now has 66 points to 64 for the two runners-up.

Maloney's second goal of the game in the final period was all Chicago needed but Sloan tallied while the Rangers were short-handed, to sow it up.
