

U.S. NAVY PLANE FIRED ON BY RUSSIAN AIRCRAFT OVER WATERS OF BERING STRAIT

WHITEFIELD, N. H. (AP) — President Eisenhower's headquarters Friday announced a U.S. navy patrol plane was "fired upon by Soviet planes" over international Bering strait waters Wednesday.

The American aircraft crashed landed in American territory with injury to some crew members.

In Michigan, the Pontiac Press said that relatives reported one of the men in the downed plane had died of his injuries. He was identified as airman Charles W. Shields, 21, of Clawson, Mich.

In Washington, the navy bureau of personnel said it had no report of any death among members of the crew.

MIG-TYPE AIRCRAFT
The defence department in Washington said the navy plane was attacked by two Soviet Mig-type aircraft "which made one firing round."

"The attack on our plane was inexplicable and unwarranted," White House press secretary James C. Hagerty said in a prepared statement. He added that "at the direction of the president," State Secretary Dulles has discussed the matter with Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov at San Francisco.

The Alaska command announced in Anchorage Thursday that seven airmen were injured and four others escaped unhurt Wednesday in the crash of a navy Neptune plane on St. Lawrence island, less than 100 miles from Siberia. All were evacuated by air from the remote Bering sea island to the Elmendorf (Alaska) air force base hospital.

ROUTINE MISSION
The navy said the four-engine craft, based at the naval air station at Kodiak, crashed and burned while making an emergency landing on "a routine patrol mission." Molotov told Dulles, Hagerty said, that he was unaware of the incident "but would at once investigate and communicate with the secretary of state."

Dulles and Molotov are attending the United Nations 10th anniversary commemorative session in San Francisco.

Hagerty made his announcement of the episode at Mountain View hotel here a few hours after Eisenhower arrived in this New Hampshire community on a tour of northern New England.

UNPROVOKED ATTACK
The defence department's brief announcement, issued after Hagerty's press conference here, said "reports indicate that there is no explanation for this unprovoked attack." It added that the American plane did not return the fire of the attacking planes.

One engine of the American plane was set afire in the encounter. St. Lawrence island, on the northwestern tip of which the plane crashed, is southwest of the Seward peninsula of Alaska, and south of the Arctic circle.

To Probe Police In Vancouver

VANCOUVER (CP)—Police chief Walter Mulligan was placed on leave of absence Friday and the Vancouver police commission asked the provincial attorney-general to investigate his department. Superintendent Alan Rossier will be acting police chief pending further orders, the commission announced. He now is head of the city traffic department.

Even while the announcement was being made, the life of Det.-Sgt. Len Cuthbert hung in the balance. The veteran officer was reported "fighting for his life" in hospital after suffering a self-inflicted bullet wound in his chest.

ISSUE STATEMENT
In a statement following a meeting of the police commission, Mayor Fred Hume said: "This afternoon the police commission announced that it had asked the attorney-general to have an inquiry into the police department and he has agreed and has arranged for the appointment of a man to hold the same."

"The inquiry will be a public inquiry and will take place as soon as possible. The attorney-general was very co-operative and stated he would only do so at the request of the commission. "Pending the inquiry, the chief constable has been placed on leave of absence."

Some hours before Mr. Hume's announcement, Sgt. Cuthbert, former head of the police gambling squad, was critically wounded when he was shot with his own revolver at police headquarters. Superintendent Harry Whelan said Sgt. Cuthbert had turned the gun on himself.

Sgt. Cuthbert, 54, was named this week in a Toronto weekly tabloid, Flash, as an officer who told the attorney-general's department of alleged corruption in the Vancouver force. The magazine currently faces a libel suit brought by police chief Walter Mulligan.

SCIENTIST'S WILL
LONDON (AP) — Sir Alexander Fleming, discoverer of penicillin, left an estate of £29,321 in his will, made public today. Fleming, who died from a heart ailment March 11, left £500 to a niece, Grace High. He ordered the rest divided equally between his widow and his son, Dr. Robert Fleming.

Gov't May Drop Insurance Scheme For Lobster Traps
OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government may abandon its insurance scheme for fishermen's lobster traps in the next year. Fisheries Minister Sinclair told the Commons Friday.

He said the cheap insurance plan financed by the treasury for the last two years has had "pretty disastrous results" financially. It applies to east coast fishermen. Mr. Sinclair said that in the last fiscal year the government took in \$26,000 in premiums for fishermen and paid out \$70,000 for losses of traps.

"You can't make money that way," he said as he discussed his annual departmental estimates in the House.

SCHEME TOO RISKY
"Unless there is an improvement," he added, "I'm afraid we'll have to drop this scheme within the next year. It's too risky to cover such gear in exposed waters."

The government insurance premiums now run from five cents for a trap worth \$1.50 for a short season to 35 cents for those over \$7 in a long season. Traps have a high mortality rate in storms. The rates recently were increased by the government, but Mr. Sinclair indicated doubt that these would carry the losses on an actuarial basis.

He did suggest, though, that prospective development of metal lobster traps could change the outlook. He said the government is experimenting with these as a substitute for the wooden traps now in use.

But he added that a cheap metal lobster trap is not too easy to devise. S. R. Balem (N.—Halifax) asked whether the government is considering allowing an open season on lobster year-round. He said some fishermen are asking for it and think it would not harm the lobster fishery.

Mr. Sinclair said a recent report by one of the department's top scientists said no conservation purpose is served by the present practice of having a closed season. However, there was no intention to change it. Fishermen had asked for it themselves to give them time for other fishing occupations.

Dealing with federal insurance on coastal fishing boats, Mr. Sinclair said that 2,563 craft under the value of \$7,500 have been insured. In the last fiscal year the government had taken in \$72,000 in premiums and paid out \$91,000 for losses.

The government insures small boats at a premium of one per cent of their value per year.

Island Members Active In Fisheries Discussion
OTTAWA (Special) — Prince Edward Island members have taken an active part in the two-day debate on fisheries estimates which ended late Friday afternoon. Speakers were T. J. Kichham, Liberal MP for Kings, and J. Angus MacLean, Conservative MP for Queens. J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal MP for Prince, was in his seat constantly beside Fisheries Minister Sinclair in the role of parliamentary assistant.

Mr. Kichham differed from the Minister of the subject as how best to reduce or eliminate lobster poaching and the taking of small lobsters. The Kings member felt that the prosecution of fishermen for landing lobsters under the legal size was outdated. He felt the menace of poaching could better be dealt with by a policy of education on this topic Mr. Sinclair said: "We think the most immediate way of curbing lobster poaching is by police action and we are following that by education in the hope that in the end police action will not be necessary."

Mr. Kichham spoke of the advance in fish processing in Prince Edward Island and invited Mr. Sinclair to come down with Mr. MacNaught to the opening of a new fresh filleting plant in Kings, later this summer. There is also a new by-products plant, he said, now processing oil and fish meal.

LODGES PROTEST
With a number of other Maritime Provinces' members, Mr. Kichham lodged a protest against the 85th anniversary celebrations of the founding of the lodge to be held in Brockville, Ont., July 12. The first Orange Lodge in Canada was established in Brockville in 1870.

50,000 Norwegians Greet Queen Elizabeth And Duke

OSLO, Norway (Reuters)—Crowds of Norwegians watched silently Friday as Queen Elizabeth II and Duke Haakon arrived at King Haakon's palace, thousands of Norwegians who had waited hours in the rain cheered loudly.

The Queen, here with the Duke of Edinburgh on a three-day state visit to Norway, placed a wreath on the simple granite memorial near Akershus castle.

Then, she joined Norway's 82-year-old King Haakon to inspect a guard of honor of royal guards, the crowd burst into applause and cheering.

Elizabeth smiled to them, bringing a new wave of cheers. Earlier Friday, she and the Duke had begun their visit to the tumultuous cheers of 50,000 Norwegians.

There was tremendous excitement on the couple's arrival at Oslo's "Quay of Honor." Crowds cheered as the Queen and her husband stepped ashore from the royal yacht Britannia.

GOES TO JAIL IN INCOME TAX CASE
HAMILTON, Ont. (CP)—A 44-year-old Hamilton underwriter Edwin Hare, Friday became the fifth man in Canada to be sent to jail for a breach of the Income Tax Act.

Hare was given a 30-day jail sentence, and a fine of \$4,300, by Magistrate Beamer W. Hopkins who said: "The seriousness of your case warrants a jail sentence. We have to deter others from doing the same thing."

The jail sentence was given on each of four charges covering the years 1950, 51, 52, and 53, the sentences to run concurrently.

Hare was found guilty last week of evading \$10,956 tax payments on his 1952 return, and this morning pleaded guilty to evasion during the three other years amounting to \$2,725.

French Authorities Move Against Algerian Rebels
CONSTANTINE, Algeria (Reuters)—French authorities moved against Algerian outlaws Friday at four points in their anti-terrorist campaign. By nightfall hundreds of Arab suspects were under arrest.

Vast screening operations were carried out here and in Philippeville, 30 miles to the northeast. Out of the Philippeville, air and ground units sprang a new offensive against outlaws engaged in sabotage activities from hideouts in ravines and hill side caves.

In the Algiers region, 25 men were seized with documents indicating they were in contact with rebel forces in the mountains. And in the rugged Aures district south of here, French air force bombers and fighters went into action against two strong rebel bands.

Working On Clam Digger
OTTAWA (CP)—Good news for the man working along the shore with shovel and bucket: The fisheries department is trying to develop a mechanical clam digger.

Fisheries Minister Sinclair told the Commons Friday his staff is working on a digger that would face and leave the smaller ones in the mud of tidal flats.

He said it might help cut the cost of labor, which makes clams high-priced.
