



## NELSON'S CAR AS IT CAME TO REST IN DITCH

# Two Are Injured When Car Rolls

SUMMERSIDE — A Saint John, N.B., man, Robert Nelson, suffered a fractured neck yesterday afternoon and had his late model car demolished when it went out of control on the Freetown road and rolled a number of times before coming to rest on its roof in the ditch on the opposite side of the road.

The accident occurred approximately one mile from the village of Freetown on the Summerside side along a straight stretch of highway.

Marks along the highway where the accident occurred appeared to indicate that the car had veered off on the shoulder of the highway, returned to the pavement and then rolled. Glass from the vehicle was strewn all over the pavement and the asphalt itself was deeply gouged.

Dr. D.G. Stewart of Crapaud, who was at the scene, when contacted last night stated that Mr. Nelson's injuries weren't terribly serious and that the patient is expected to be transferred by ambulance to a hospital in Saint John early today.

It is believed that Mr. Nelson, a painter, had been on the Island approximately a month, mostly in Charlottetown and that, at the time of the accident, had been engaged in painting one of the large stores here.

He was proceeding in the general direction of Summerside when the accident occurred and was transferred to hospital by an ambulance from Rooney's Funeral home here.

A second occupant in the vehicle, Eddy Murphy of Freetown, escaped with severe bruises but was released from hospital early last evening.

He recalled the car going out of control and the next thing he remembered, he said, was lying in a field. "I was thrown about 25 feet", he said, "and I came to with this red-headed fellow standing over me". He recalled "the first thing that came to my mind was that it was an angel and then I thought to myself 'I didn't know there were red-headed angels'".

Mr. Murphy returned home last evening, aching but not injured seriously. The accident was investigated by Summerside RCMP.

# 68 Producers Elect Potato Board Reps.

SUMMERSIDE — More than twice the combined number of potato producers who turned out to the Kings and Queens county marketing board meetings attended the Prince County meeting here last night to elect two county representatives to the board.

Sixty-eight producers elected Borden Greenan of Newton and Arnold Wood of O'Leary to represent the county. Mr. Wood garnered 40 votes while Mr. Greenan was elected with 24 votes.

Two other nominees, John Raynor of Casumpec, picked up 22 votes and George McMurdo of Kelvin received 23 votes.

This was the largest turnout of producers at meetings in all three counties to elect representatives. At the Kings County meeting only 24 producers registered while in Charlottetown Wednesday night at the Queens County meeting, there were only six producers.

This completes the grower representation on the board that will assume responsibility near the end of June.

**OTHER COUNTRIES**

Knud Jorgensen, Fredericton, and George Howatt, French River were named to represent Queens County producers; and Louis Jenkins, Lower Millington, and Keith Townsend, Souris River, were chosen at a Montague meeting to represent Kings County on the new board.

# Town Announces Capital Budget

A special town council meeting was held here last night to announce a capital budget for 1965 of \$212,095.65.

Deputy Mayor George Key Jr., who chaired the meeting in the absence of Mayor W.E. Jenkins, told the councillors that the finance committee had spent a longer time on the capital budget than on the current budget and issued a warning that "we intend to stick to this budget".

Deputy Mayor Key is also chairman of the finance committee.

One of the major items on the budget is the construction of the new town garage and warehouse on Harvard Street adjoining the electric plant.

This year the street paving program will be similar to the programs carried out for the last three years and approximately \$90,000 will be spent on this program.

Deputy Mayor Key noted that, with the view of providing modern paving throughout the town, the councillors from the east and center wards have consented and seen fit that a concerted effort be made in the west ward this year to equalize the paving throughout all three wards.

The chairman of the water and sewerage committee, Coun. Ernest Morrison, explained that one of the budget items, a lift pump and collector system to serve the north end of town, will apply, in particular, to Athena Regional High School which has been giving a lot of trouble, especially the septic tank. He also said that the town had been pumping water overflow from the school area for the past three weeks.

The deputy mayor pointed out that this budget item had been approved by the 1964 council but the project had not been carried out and the reason for this was that a better solution to the problem was sought. But it was found this is the only way to alleviate the problem.

Coun. Frances Perry commented on a proposed civil defence centre for the town and stated that the amount of money put up by the town for this proposed centre would be matched by the provincial government along with a substantial grant from the federal government.

The firm of Curran and Briggs Ltd. of Summerside was awarded the tender for the patching of pavement in the town. The company's tender was \$19 per ton.

The tender of Raymond Blaquiere was accepted for the laying of various new sidewalks and curbs and the replacement of certain old sidewalks.

Deputy Mayor Key rendered an explanation for one of the budget items tabled: survey monuments. He stated that a federal department had approached the town regarding a survey of the town and had stated that a survey of the town would be made free of charge if the town would provide the bench marks. The survey, he added, is now being carried out.

He also said it was interesting to note that the harbor cleanup under the winter works program had cost the town in the vicinity of \$1,000 and he believed the total payroll was in the vicinity of \$12,000.

A total of 394 scouts received training during the year.

A gain in membership of nine per cent was reported for the year. This gain was shown in the wolf cub section of the movement. A total of 211 leaders and 542 scouts and 1095 cubs was reported.
