LABOR EARNINGS UP

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian workers earned an estimated \$990,000,000 in February, compared with \$984,000,000 in January and \$950,000,000 in February 1954, the bureau of statistics reported Monday. The labor force numbered 3,846,000 workers in mid-February compared with 3,785,000 last year. Average weekly earnings in non-agricultural industries rose to \$60.89 in February compared with \$59.22 last year.
