

DEATH OF SIR DOMINICK DALY.—It is with profound regret that we learn from private sources of the death of this distinguished Irishman. Since 1859 he has administered the Government of South Australia with much ability and success. As we have not yet learned the full particulars of Sir Dominick's death, and are somewhat deficient in his political and personal history, we are constrained to the present to convey to our readers, in this brief manner, the tidings of the sad event—which will be heard in many a household in this Colony with unfeigned regret, and from whose family altar will ascend the simple prayer—may he rest in peace.

Since writing the foregoing, we have received our exchange papers, in which we find the following particulars relative to Sir Dominick Dalry—

“Advices from South Australia, via Panama, to March 28th, state that Sir Dominick Dalry, late Governor of the Colony, died rather unexpectedly on the 19th February. He had been illing for some time, but no immediate danger was anticipated until a few hours before his death, when his medical advisers announced his approaching dissolution to the members of the family. His Excellency retained full possession of his faculties to the last, and passed away as if going to sleep. The event has caused great regret among all classes of colonists, and a procession of about 1,000 of the principal inhabitants followed the remains on foot from the Roman Catholic Cathedral to the place of interment. Sir Dominick Dalry was born in the North of Ireland, in August, 1799, and was consequently 69 years of age. He was at one time a prominent politician in Canada, and in 1851 was knighted and appointed Governor of Tobago. In 1854 he was transferred to Prince Edward Island, and in 1859 to South Australia.”

The report of the remarks made in the House of Assembly of this Island, concerning the assassination of the Hon. Thomas D'Arcy McGee, and which we publish in to-day's paper, has been furnished to us by Mr. Stainforth McGowan. With the limited space at our disposal, we will be unable to publish any of the extended debates of the House, with the exception, perhaps, of the debate on the important subject of Education. We hope soon to have the copy of this debate placed in our hands, and we shall lose no time in giving it to our readers.

CHARLOTTETOWN DEBATING CLUB.—On Friday evening last, the Literary and Musical Entertainment, which closed the winter session of the Charlotetown Literary and Debating Society, was held in the Temperance Hall, before a very large and appreciative audience. Owing to the unavoidable absence of the President, Vice President Louis H. Davies, Esq., took the Chair, and, in a few opening remarks, apologized for the absence of the President, and called the meeting to order. The Programme for the evening contained many interesting and amusing pieces. The different performers acquitted themselves remarkably well, and elicited the hearty applause of their hearers. The music was excellent, and highly creditable to Messrs. Earle and Vinnicoube, who received a well merited vote of thanks, and at a rather late hour the audience dispersed, well pleased with the evening's entertainment.—Pat.

FARMERS' CLUB.—At a meeting held last evening, the President, Dr. Jenkins, in the Chair, it was decided to establish in connection with the Club, a Servants' Registry, where masters can, for 1s. 6d., enter their names and address, together with other particulars they may deem necessary. Servants in want of employment, will, on payment of 9d., have a similar privilege. Members of the Club will hire none who cannot produce satisfactory references, and a written discharge from last employer. A Committee was appointed to examine and report on G. W. Millner's Grain Sower, and another to ascertain whether a warehouse for storing grain can be rented for the use of members who choose to bring their oats into the city early in the fall when the roads are out.—Pat.

All Sorts of Paragraphs.

In the House of Commons on the 26th Mr. Fawcett gave notice that on an early day after Easter he should move the following resolution—That, in the opinion of this House, the Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, and other inhabitants of Ireland, ought to be placed upon an equality with those of the Established Church, and that all religious disabilities with respect to the following, viz: professorships, and scholarships of Trinity College, Dublin, should be removed. He intended also to move for a select committee, with a view of administering and arranging the revenues of that college, so that it should more properly fulfill the functions of a national university.

The Earl of Carnarvon, who led the gallant but reckless charge of the six hundred “into the valley of death” at Ballaklava, has just died in England. He was noted for other things besides this remarkable act of daring. He bore the reputation of a tyrant, of hasty and unfeeling temper, and of a private character which made him approach to the peerage. His private quarrels were numerous. He was tried before the House of Lords for killing a man in a duel, and was acquitted on the merest quibble.

On Saturday, the 18th inst., Whelan, the supposed assassin of the Hon. Mr. McGee, was fully committed for trial at the next assizes. It appears that before leaving the Police Court, he acted very violently, and threatened Mr. O'Reilly, Queen's Counsel, who conducted the prosecution, that he would be the next to suffer.

An Ottawa despatch says:—“In the Senate, the Alien Bill was amended by making residence in the Dominion of one year, sufficient for naturalization purposes. Tenders have been invited from the Inman, Cunard, and other Steamship Companies, for the conveyance of mails between Halifax and Great Britain.”

The late Hon. T. D. McGee left a wife and two daughters, one aged sixteen and the other nine. As already announced by telegraph, the Dominion Government have generously provided for them. Her Majesty the Queen has sent them a message of sympathy through the cable.

The Committee of House of Commons on Fisheries and Navigation met on the 16th, and agreed to recommend the building of two additional fish-houses, one on Bird's Island, in the passage between Cape Breton and P. E. Island, and the other at Ingonish, Victoria County, N. S.

It is believed that the seven Italian ships of war that lately sailed on a secret mission have gone to the La Platte River to redress the wrongs which eighty thousand Italians, who have settled there, have suffered from the government of the Argentine Confederation.

The Vicar-General of Ottawa delivered the sermon at the McGee obsequies in Montreal. At the conclusion of a period, where he eloquently denounced the Fenians, he was greeted by loud cheers, which the Rev. gentleman suppressed, saying, “This is the house of God.”

A telegram from Secretary Seward was received by Gen. Averill, U. S. Consul General in Montreal, assuring him that the American Government joined in regret, and earnestly hoped that the perpetrators of the shocking and heinous crime (Hon. T. D. McGee's murder) might be brought to justice.

PAPAL ZOUAVES.—We (Montreal True Witness) learn from *Le Nouveau Monde* that the Committee has received offers of service from 215 persons, and that a sum of \$10,285 to defray expenses, have been subscribed for.

The Hon. Mr. McGee was assassinated like Pius IX's Minister, Count Rossi, in 1848, by covering the carotid artery, which carries blood from the heart to the brain.

The Emperor of the French attained the age of sixty years on the 20th of this month.

News by Telegraph.

MONTREAL, April 20.—Rumors prevailed in town yesterday that the Government were in possession of information respecting the Fenian Conspiracy to assassinate Mr. McGee; that they consisted of forty in number, who drew lots, &c. Execution of deed fell to Whelan.

OTTAWA, 23d.—Two detectives gave sworn narration of a confession they overheard in Jail between Doyle and Whelan, in which Whelan fully acknowledged shooting McGee.

ST. JOHN, April 27.—Decisive Battle fought on Good Friday by General Napier, King Theodore and great number of the Abyssinians killed. Prisoners released.—War settled.—Gold in New York 39.

OTTAWA, April 20th.—The examination into the assassination case continues with closed doors. Patrick Buckley has been re-arrested. A waiter in Saloon of House of Commons named Kelly has been arrested. R. G. Halliburton is talked of as Senator in the place of the late Hon. B. Wier. W. A. Henry is also spoken of. The Committee on Fisheries has agreed to recommend the imposition of five dollars a ton on American fishing vessels, the proceeds to be applied to bounties for fishermen.

ST. JOHN, April 23rd.—London, April 21st.—Said that two men supposed to be Fenians were arrested to-night near servants' door of Buckingham Palace. They were carrying a hamper containing a gallon of liquid phosphorus, or Greek fire. Parties made desperate resistance, and were with difficulty secured; the third person fled, and escaped.—Napier reported on the 1st instant; he was at Abdou, thirty miles from Magdala. King's Army at River Jommas.—Carrier created a Baronet. Whelan committed for trial.—Documents discovered establishing existence of Fenian Organization in the Dominion.

LONDON, April 23, midnight.—In the House of Lords, the Earl of Buckingham and the Earl of Carnarvon eulogized the late Hon. Thomas D'Arcy McGee, of Canada.

LONDON, April 23, noon.—Marriage of Prince Humbert, heir presumptive of King of Italy, with Princess Margaret, his cousin, took place yesterday at the Chapel Royal, in Turin. King Victor Emmanuel, Crown Prince Frederick William of Prussia, Prince Napoleon and Princess Clotilde, and a great many Italian notables were present. Great preparations making in Florence for reception of the Prince and his wife.

DUBLIN, April 24.—The Prince of Wales embarked for England to-day. Before sailing he gave a dinner on the Royal Yacht, there were about forty guests present, the utmost good feeling and enthusiasm prevailed. Consols closed at 93 1/2. Gold 135 1/2.

LONDON, April 24, midnight.—Starting Intelligence has been received from Australia. Prince Alfred, who is visiting Sydney, was shot and dangerously wounded by an unknown person. The would-be assassin, who is said to be a Fenian, was promptly arrested. The Prince, according to last advices, was slowly recovering.

Memoranda. Schooner *Minnie*, R. McKenzie, arrived in New London Harbor, on the 21st inst., three days from Canso. Reports having seen off East Point a vessel sunk in 13 fathoms water—apparently American—Mainmast broke off at deck and adrift, held by the main rigging at head. Foremast broke off about fifty feet from deck. Main boom broke off at the strings, held by the main sheet. Spars pine. Probably she is the Schooner *Fashion*, a fishing vessel lost last season, belonging to Cape Ann. This Report was handed to us by Captain John McKenzie, who examined her with a boat.
