LARGE ASSETS.—Some idea of the enormous amount invested in life insurance in the United States, may be gathered from the report of the Superintendent of Insurance of the State of New York for 1886. The three leading companies stand thus: First stands the Mutual Life, of New York, with assets of \$17,224,847.36; next the Equitable, \$72,127,773.79; third in point of assets, the New York Life, \$71,941,992.29.

POLICE PERSUASIONS.—Last night the policemen gathered in a countryman summoned as a witness in a Scott Act case, but who failed to respond when called; and this morning they captured a man charged with the larceny of a locket from the store of Mr. John A. Cameron, Kent Street. Both appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day. The Scott Act witness, after giving his testimony, was again allowed his liberty; and the larceny case was postponed until Monday, the defendant being released on bail.

Religion: Protestants, 4; Catholics, 4. Nationality: English, 2; Scotch, 2; Irish, 3; African, 1.

WEE AFTER THE EVENT.—Between seven and eight o'clock last evening, a truckman named John Read, while passing along the sidewalk, slipped and fell into one of the several open cellars on the burnt district on Great George Street, cracking the bones of his right thigh. He will probably be confined to his residence for some weeks. During the past few months we have repeatedly advised the falling in of these dangerous cellars in order to prevent accidents such as occurred last evening, but our suggestion was not acted upon until this morning—a day after the fact.

SELECTING A TROPHY.—The Council of the Provincial Rifle Association met in the Secretary's office, King Street, last evening. Lieut.-Colonel Irving presided. The selecting of an Inter-Provincial trophy was the principal business for which the meeting was called. Several handsome designs of cups, selected by Captain Hart, of St. John, N. B., from the celebrated manufactory of Elkington & Co., 22 Regent Street, London, were shown, and after some discussion the choice of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick teams was approved of. This cup is of solid silver, with ebony base, and is handsomely chased. The Council also decided to adopt arm badges, similar to those worn by the winning teams in previous years. The next competition for the cup will be held at Halifax in July next.

SHIPPING DISASTERS.

Total Wreck of two Vessels.

ALBERTON, Nov. 5. The schooner Hugh M., of Annapolis, stranded during last night's gale, on North Bar, near the entrance of this harbor. The vessel's bottom is gone and she is sanded up and full of water.

The vessel is owned by Messrs. Delong & Seaman, of Boston.

The schooner Spy, bound for Chatham, got ashore yesterday at Tignish. The cargo of produce and the vessel are a total loss.

Both crews are safe.

The Balance of Trade.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.

During the last fiscal year Canada exported goods to the United States to the value of thirty-nine and a half million dollars. The imports were thirty-five million dollars, showing a balance of trade in favor of Canada of four and a half million.

Of the trade last year, the Maritime Provinces imported two millions four hundred thousand dollars' worth, and exported four millions nine hundred thousand.

Of the foreign trade of the United States during the past year, Great Britain absorbed thirty-eight per cent., Germany ten per cent., France nine per cent., the West Indies seven per cent., and Canada five and a quarter per cent.

The C. P. R. Solicitor—An Important Suit.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.

It is officially announced that Judge Clarke, of Coburg, has been appointed Chief Solicitor of the Canadian Pacific.

Chief Hon. J. C. Abbott, who it is understood will shortly join the Board of Directors.

Miss Boudreau has taken action for \$10,000 damages against Dr. Bessey and the corporation of Montreal, alleging that she was compelled by that officer to submit to vaccination during the small pox epidemic, and that grievous illness followed from the effects of which she has not yet recovered.

Balfour's Assurances.

LONDON, Nov. 4.

Mr. Balfour attended the first annual meeting of the Midland Conservative Union, at Birmingham to-day, accompanied by a detective and Chief Leanington, of the police.

At Birmingham, armed detectives were posted at the depot to watch suspicious characters. Mr. Balfour received, during the day, a hundred addresses from Conservative associations. He gave assurance that the Government resolved to proceed boldly and firmly with the work in hand in Ireland, and bring it to a good conclusion.

The Unemployed.

LONDON, Nov. 4.

Lord Salisbury Matthews, Home Secretary, and Sir Charles Warren, Commissioner of the Metropolitan police, held a conference to-day in reference to the condition of the unemployed of London, and the means to be employed to prevent serious riots on Lord Mayor's Day, the 9th inst.

Sad Result of Dissipation.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 4.

Last night Charles M. Brownfield, a dissipated man, cut off the heads of his wife and child, cut the throat of his brother-in-law from ear to ear and hanged himself to the ceiling. He left a note saying that gambling caused the tragedy.

Important Appointment.

LONDON, Nov. 4.

The Prince of Wales attended a banquet to-day by the United Service Club to the Duke of Cambridge in honor of his joining the British army. The Duke of Cambridge will be appointed commander-in-chief by patent. The last patent was issued to the Duke of Wellington.

Sir Fred Middleton Retires.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.

Sir Fred Middleton's retirement from the Imperial Army takes place to-day. His career in Her Majesty's service has been an honorable one. He received his first commission in 1842, in the 5th Regiment and is therefore 45 years in the army.
