A MURDERER SENTENCED.

Reported Retirement of Laurier.

Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner: MONTREAL, Oct. 31.

Flour quiet and steady at last quotations. Grain not active. Freights firm.

The banks have made no changes in the dividends for the past half year.

Williams was sentenced at Toronto, yesterday, to be hung for the murder of his wife.

It is reported now that Laurier will retire from public life.

WAR NEWS.

SILISTRIA, Oct. 30.

The Russians are concentrating a battery on the Island, two miles east of here.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

The capture of Telisthe indicates that the Russians have a firm hold on the Plevna and Sofia roads, but are not yet certain that Plevna is entirely surrounded. The road to Widdin by the way of Rapora, it is believed, is still in possession of the Turks and Ghazi. Osman Pasha will make desperate efforts to keep it.

Details of the affairs at Gorny-Dubruk, and Telische, make it certain that they are more than mere raids on the Turkish communications, that in fact they are part of the new Russian movement involving an entire change of front, which is still further developed by the transfer of the Roumanians to Bigot. Telische was surrounded on the 28th by one cavalry and two infantry brigades of Imperial Guards, and a brigade of Cossacks. They bombarded for two hours from 72 guns, when the Turkish garrison surrendered. There was no assault, and the killed and wounded on both sides was insignificant.

The Russian Government has asked credit for \$6,250,000 for the construction of a new railway.

A rising is feared in Albania, Epirus and Macedonia. The Porte is endeavoring to muster 230,000 irregulars to put down the insurrection, and has ordered a merciless treatment of insurgents.

GENERAL NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

The Queen will grant a pardon to Alice Rhodes, and commutes the death sentence in the case of the other prisoners to imprisonment for life.

PARIS, Oct. 30.

It seems settled that the Cabinet are abandoning the idea of resistance and will retire before the 7th November, or merely hold office long enough to offer justification of its policy in the Senate. Whether it retires a little earlier or later is quite immaterial. It is essential, and the now apparently settled thing is that it will retire.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

Thirty-nine Canadian masons, who arrived in London to-day, have left the works at the Law Courts and placed themselves under the protection of the strike committee.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.

Mrs. Joseph C. Clark, of Ipswich, Mass., was burned to death on Sunday morning by the explosion of a kerosene lamp.

Seven masked men knocked down and robbed the agent, Wilson, of the Northern Pennsylvania Railroad, near Helentown Pa., on Friday night, and they secured \$900, a watch, and other valuables. Wilson was fatally injured. A series of wholesale robberies, supposed to be the work of the same gang, have been committed at Davisville and Newton, Bucks county. Two women were outraged and valuable horses were stolen. Much excitement prevails.

Mayor Ely to-day received an appeal for aid from the Mayor of Fernandis, Florida. The appeal says 800 families will have to be supported before business can be resumed. They had on hand \$300, and required \$1,000 to keep the well from starving and supply the sick with necessities.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

Of £531,000 gold, which arrived on Saturday, £146,000 went into the bank, £50,000 being taken out for Egypt. The larger part of the consignment being bar gold, is held over for exportation to the Continent. Should the decline in French exchange show a profit on the operation, the remainder will likely go into bank to-day. The bullion in the Bank of England to-day increased £119,000.

Local and Other Items.

OPENING SERVICES.—Sunday morning, Oct. 28th, though uninviting for either a drive or walk, did not hinder a large assembly gathering in the newly erected Methodist Church at Black River, Mill Cove, to hear the Rev. J. Lathern preach the opening sermon and take part in the dedicatory service, both of which were solemn, instructive and interesting. In the afternoon the house was again filled, when the Rev. F. W. Moore delivered a sermon in keeping with the occasion, full of earnest gospel teaching and pathetic appeal, making a deep impression upon the congregation. The Rev. J. C. Berrie conducted the evening service, which was well attended notwithstanding the darkness of the night. Collections, fifty dollars.

ALASKA IN A BAD WAY.—San Francisco, Oct. 29.—A Victoria despatch says the steamship California, from Sitka, arrived this morning. The revenue cutter Otter Walcott arrived at Sitka on the 7th. The Chimituc Indians had arrived a few days previous to participate in a grand powwow, given by Sitka Jack and his tribe. The revenue cutter arrived just in time to prevent the Indians from destroying the barricades around the town. They had already commenced and had pulled down some 200 feet, being protected by 70 armed warriors from any interference by the whites. The citizens think the timely arrival of the cutter was the means of preventing the Indians during their drunken revelry from murdering the whites.
