THE REMARKABLE STORY OF A NINE-YEAR-OLD BOY'S ADVENTURES.

A nine-year-old son of Hiram Taylor of Wilmington, O., mysteriously disappeared about thirteen months ago. He was an unusually bright child, not worse than the average boy. He boarded up his money, read books of travels and was passionately and of horse. Search was made, but all traces of the child appeared lost. 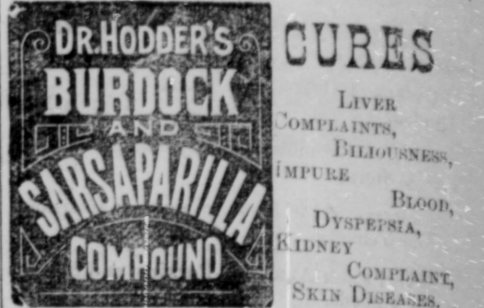
