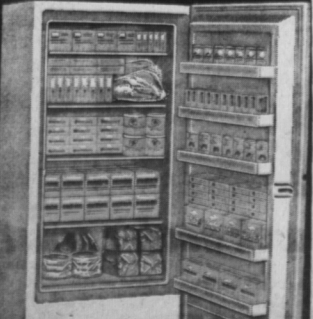

Youth To Be Accented In Liberal Candidates

Provincial Liberals "will go into action at once" in preparation for a provincial election, and the "accent will definitely be youth," Leader Alex Matheson told The Guardian-Patriot yesterday.

"I'm 59 years of age, myself, and I certainly don't want anyone older than that in the contest," he emphasized.

"We want young men. Like George Ferguson of Murray River, a winner in a 5th Kings by-election last year, who can go out and canvass every home and person in the district," Mr. Matheson observed. "The party had too many older candidates in the field in 1959," he emphasized.

REID JOINS IN CALL

Provincial Liberal Federation president, E. D. Reid, Charlottetown, joined the party leader in the call to action. "We've got to get on our feet immediately," he emphasized.

Mr. Matheson observed that a provincial election must be held "but at any time, and added: "but we want our men in the field right away, even though it's not called for a year or more. The Shaw government was elected on September 11, 1959, and could go the full five years, until 1964, but a government rarely waits that long to seek a fresh mandate from the people."

CONCERN EXPRESSED

The premier was relaxing yesterday at his Strathearny home where he was understandably happy about the result here yesterday. "I feel the result rarely waits that long to give confidence in our provincial government, as well as in the federal administration," the premier observed.

Analyzing the federal vote yesterday in terms of provincial voting districts, Mr. Matheson noted with concern that the party had won only four provincial districts. They include the fourth districts of Queens, Prince and Kings, which they had won in the provincial election of 1959, and First Kings, where Liberal candidate Tom Kitchman resides.

The Liberal leader was "surprised" that the PCs swept all four P.E.I. seats, but expressed real concern about the "mess" in which the country has been left at the national level by yesterday's balloting.

Mr. Matheson added, though, that neither the winning PC candidates in Prince or Kings yesterday achieved an overall majority. It's the first time in history that a federal member has been elected here with less than 50 per cent of the vote, he observed.

Mrs. Margaret Macdonald's request of Chief of Police C.W. MacArthur, for failing to stop for a red traffic light another accused was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Pleading guilty to having intoxicating liquor to a private individual west at his residence, an accused was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

One was given a 30-day suspended sentence, another was given 30 days, with commitment being withheld until 5 p.m. yesterday after the accused promised to be out of the city by that time. The eighth was remanded until June 20, without bail.

Diabetic Day School Mooted For Island In Late Summer

Recently returned from the day school for diabetics, held last weekend in Moncton, N.B., Charles E. Pruegg, administrator of the provincial Diabetic Control Plan, said yesterday, it is hoped that similar schools will eventually be held in Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Pruegg revealed that he has had discussions on the school program with Dr. O.H. Curtis, director of the health department, and that the latter is very sympathetic to the idea.

Working together, the department of health and the P.E.I. Diabetic Association, hope to be able to hold a day school late this summer. He pointed out that it is as such gatherings as this that sufferers appear to let the barriers they have built around themselves, fall away.

The third parties spring up under them in the first place, charged the Liberal leader who went back to 1921 and the emergence of the Progressive party for his example.

"The Liberals won a plurality of 117 votes in 1921, the Conservatives 59 and the Progressives 44 but that followed a 1917 and a wartime Union government under Conservative Premier Robert L. Borden from 1917 to 1921.

There was no clear majority in 1905 when the Liberals won 101, the Conservatives 116, the Progressives 24 and Labor two and that situation persisted through the 1926 election when the Liberals won the biggest block of 118 seats in the then 245-seat house. The Conserva-
