Resident Of Sherbrooke Dies

An old and highly esteemed resident of Sherbrooke, Mr. Joseph Simmons passed away on Sunday at the age of 82 years, after an illness of short duration. Mr. Simmons was born in 1854 at Lot 16. He resided in Lot 16 during his younger days and then moved to St. Eleanors. In 1928 he removed to Sherbrooke where he lived until his death. He was a progressive farmer and enjoyed the high esteem of his neighbours. He was a life long member of the Presbyterian Church and during his residence in Lot 16 he was an elder on the church and Superintendent of the Sunday School. Of later years he attended the Summerside Presbyterian Church. He was a Liberal in politics and always took an active interest in political affairs.

Mr. Simmons was twice married, his first wife was Elizabeth Rochford, who predeceased him twenty years ago. His second wife, Mary Elizabeth Stewart, daughter of Charles P. Stewart survives him. There are two sons James L. and C. Alfred. His sister, Mrs. Fred Simmons of Wilmot Valley is the only member left of a family of twelve. Much sympathy is extended to the bereaved.

The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon from his late home to the Lot 16 Church and was very largely attended. Rev. Walter MacCleary conducted the services, assisted at Lot 16 by Rev. Mr. Woodside.—S

Warehouse And Store Burned In Miscouche

The Summerside Fire Brigade had an early morning call from Miscouche on Monday to aid in putting out the fire, which destroyed the store and warehouse of Mr. D. B. MacNeill, with all their contents.

The fire was discovered about 8 o'clock and was raging fiercely in the interior of the store. Bucket brigades from Linkletter Road and St. Eleanors, assisted the Miscouche brigade in trying to quell the flames and keep the fire from spreading. Mr. Arthur Gaudet's house next door caught fire several times, the back of the house was burned and considerable damage was done to the furniture by water.

At 8:30 when it looked as if the fire was spreading a call was sent through for Summerside, who answered the call and sent out their hand pump with Mr. W. B. MacNeill, Fire Chief, in charge. They succeeded in confining the flames to MacNeill's buildings. The entire stock of general merchandise, machinery, oils and paints in the warehouse attached to the store besides all the stock in the store was totally destroyed. The damage was estimated around \$5,000, which would include the buildings and
