Local and Other Items

St. Joseph's Convent.—Don't miss the social tonight.

SCHOOL CLOSED.—The school at Williamston, N. S., has been closed on account of measles.

HE WAS A SPORT.—A small boy in an elementary school on being asked what were the races that had dominated England since the invasion of the Romans, replied: Epsom races, Ascot races, Newmarket races, and Doncaster races.

TWO FERTILE VALLEYS.—About 125,000 barrels of apples have been shipped from the Annapolis and Cornwallis Valleys to the English markets, and this does not represent more than one-half of the quantity available for export.—Halifax Herald.

PROSPEROUS CLYDE.—During the past eleven months 246 vessels, representing 380,000 tons, have been built and launched on the Clyde. This is the best record in a decade. For the present month 50,000 tons are in hand, and a prodigious amount of naval work.

STRANGE BOOK LEAVES.—A curious volume has been presented to the Chelsea public library. It is a Burmese book written, or rather engraved, as no ink is used, with a stylus upon some 300 strips of dried palm leaves. The palm leaves are held together by two pieces of wood, and the edges of the whole are decorated in gold and vermilion.—London.

OATMEAL AND MILK.—The Department of Agriculture at Ottawa has discovered from experiments in the poultry feeding establishment at Carl-ton Place that the best flesh-food for fowl is oatmeal ground as fine as flour, mixed with skimmed milk. Poultry on that diet have taken on flesh with remarkable speed. Even Prof. Robertson was astonished at the result of the experiment.

ISLANDER TO BE KNIGHTED.—An Ottawa despatch says: "On the occasion of the inauguration of the McDonald mining and chemistry building at McGill University on December 20th, it is said here that Mr. W. C. McDonald, the generous benefactor to the University, will be created a K. C. M. G." Mr. McDonald, it may be perhaps unnecessary to add, is a Prince Edward Islander.

CROW'S NEST OIL.—The latest sensation out Roseland way is the discovery of an oil belt not far from the Crow's Nest Pass, the only oil deposit in Western Canada. Experts report favorably on the formation, and oil found floating on the creeks is pronounced of excellent quality. The oil is supposed to have its origin in the coal beds of the Crow's Nest Pass.

CANADA AHEAD.—The fact that Canada sends 55 per cent of the cheese imported by Great Britain, while the United States sends only 24 per cent is explained by the thorough organization of the Canadian dairymen, who are united in an endeavor to produce a uniformly high grade suited to the demands of the English market. In the province of Ontario alone there are eighteen associations of cheese makers representing 1,205 factories, with an annual output of 100,000,000 pounds.

A QUEER TABLE.—Lew-lynn Cunningham, Dorchester, N. B., has recently completed a table which stands unique as a specimen of handiwork with carpenter's tools, says the Vancouver world. It contains 160,000 separate pieces of wood, and has been in course of construction for over fifteen years. There are two hundred and seventy different kinds of wood in its make up, and these have been gathered from all parts of the world, as well as relics from railroad disasters, floods, big fires, battle fields, old government ships, and others commemorative of important events. The number of hours spent on its construction was 8,692. In the centre of the top is a checker board, whose pieces are the largest and yet are only 1 1/2 inches square. The finest work, into which are worked the smallest pieces, figure about 1,200 of them to the square inch.

No Cause For Jealousy.

St. John, N. B., Dec. 3.—Two of the Allans and the minister of railways were present at the luncheon party on board the Parisian yesterday. Hugh E. Allan said that his company was building five new ships. Blair's remarks contained nothing of special interest on winter port matters, except that there was business for both Halifax and St. John, and no cause of jealousy existed.

Gus Sweeney, driving a team across the track, was struck by an express train going out of North street and hurled some distance. One leg was broken.
