Young Lepers Form Colorful Guard of Honor

ENUGU, Nigeria (Reuters) — Young lepers in boy scout and girl guide uniforms formed a colorful guard of honor Thursday as the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh visited a leper colony. The royal couple visited Nigeria's main leper colony on the Oji river 30 miles west of here. They were the first members of the royal family ever to step inside a leper colony. During a one-hour visit, they chatted with many of the 630 patients and watched students, including many children, being trained in handicrafts, carpentry, weaving and as blacksmiths and tinmiths. A 48-year-old blind patient who has been living in the colony for nine years told the Queen she had brought "joy and happiness" to him and his fellow patients by her visit. A F.C. Savory, the English supervisor who has been at Oji river for 10 years, said the public's fear of the once dreaded disease could be dispelled by knowledge that it would take 10 years of living, eating and sleeping with lepers before the disease could be contracted. "People all over the world will read that the Queen and the duke penetrated a leper settlement, and this will convince them as nothing else could that most of their fears of the disease are groundless," he said. After the tour, the royal couple left by air for Benin City and Lagos to continue their tour of Britain's biggest colony.

Traffic Snarled On Water St. In Summerside After Storm

Traffic congestion on Summerside's Water Street has been a major problem since the last snow storm, but traffic tie-ups yesterday afternoon reached an all-time high. Huge banks on either side of the main thoroughfare make it reasonably difficult for two-way traffic, but when inconsiderate motorists park their cars at an angle, with the front end protruding into the bank and the rear-end protruding into the street, the result is an oversize traffic snarl. At one time yesterday afternoon, two members of the Summerside R.C.M.P. detachment were observed untangling the mass of vehicles which had bogged down because of one of these "Summerside daredevils" parked his car on a tangent reducing the lane to one-way traffic, which was made all the more cumbersome when a high truck-trailer tried to crawl its way through. The snow removal squad started hauling the snow off after Street last evening but due to a breakdown in equipment were forced to an early halt.

BURMA TALKS TOUGH RANGOON (Reuters)—Burmese Prime Minister U Nu said Monday in a broadcast to underground Communist rebels that their leaders' demands for a negotiated settlement of a nine-year old insurrection were "out of the question."

He called on the rebels to lay down their arms and surrender under the government's amnesty terms.

Eden Satisfied With His Visit To U.S. And Canada

LONDON (CP)—Prime Minister Eden returned to London from his North American visit and Thursday said he was satisfied with the work of the last week although he admitted that British differences with the United States over Formosa still persist. Looking tired and haggard after a 12-day trip to Washington and Ottawa, the 58-year-old prime minister told newspaper men at London airport after a delayed Atlantic flight. "If you believe, as I do, that Anglo-Canadian and Anglo-American relations are the foundations of peace you would be, as I am, content with the work of the past week. "While we were in Ottawa the prime minister of Canada congratulated the foreign secretary (Selwyn Lloyd) and myself on the outcome of the work which we had done in Washington. "We were frank in expressing our view and the Americans in expressing theirs," he said. "I can assure you that relations between ourselves and the United States have never been closer than they are today." Both Britain and the United States, he added, had made it perfectly clear that they still regard German reunification as essential to peace. Their most urgent concern however, was the Israeli-Arab dispute — "the most immediate danger in the Middle East." "Both the American and Canadian governments gave strong support to the five-nation Baghdad pact, (which we intend to do all we can to make truly effective)," Eden said. Britain, Turkey, Iran, Iraq and Pakistan are the pact members. Their BOAC stratoscruiser ran into strong headwinds and made an unscheduled stop at Gander, Nfld., for more fuel for the eight-hour transatlantic hop. Eden did not leave the airliner at Gander. The plane arrived at London airport three hours late. The weather was chilly and there was snow. The prime minister said it was colder in London than in Ottawa.
