COURT RECORD.—In the Charlottetown Police Court last year there were 340 convictions, 134 dismissals and three cases sent up to the Supreme Court. The business was greater than in 1919, the receipts being over \$900 more. There were 139 convictions and 25 dismissals for drunkenness. For breach of the Prohibition Act there were 25 convictions, and 24 dismissals and 28 seizures of liquor. There were 58 convictions and 24 dismissals for breach of the Motor Vehicle Act.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The funeral of the late Mr. Charles McGregor took place yesterday afternoon and was very largely attended. Many floral tributes bore silent testimony to the esteem in which the deceased was held in the community and the general sympathy with the bereaved family. The service was conducted by Rev. G. C.
