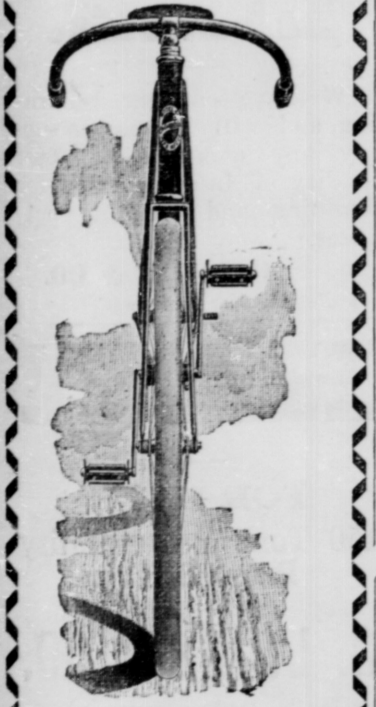

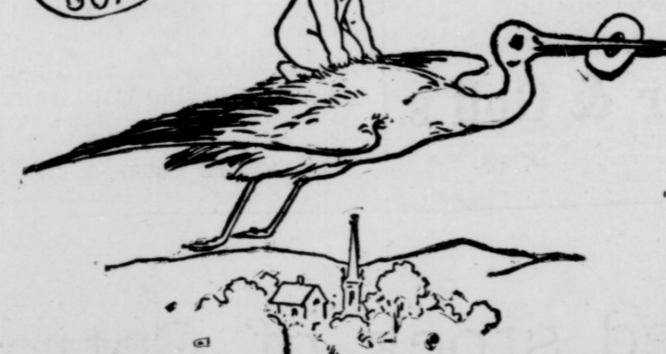
P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL

Sir,—Regarding the roads and bridges from Souris to Goswin Bras, particularly on the east side of the river, to travel the Island all over one must find such a road in any settlement. When I was a boy I used to hear my grandfather talk about the roads. When he first settled here he used to cross what they call Hughes' brook on a few poles. Well it is very little better at the present day. I think it is about time we had a new bridge built, not put down two feet as the last one was when it was built. We have now to climb one of the most hills in King's County. I think it is about time our Government did something for this place. When asking a man last week if he intended tendering for the drawing of a bridge to our factory at Goswin Bras, what did he say? "I would have to first get a team of n'ers for such a road, for to get down Hughes Hill, one would have to invent airbrakes on a wagon." It is costing us double the amount it ought to, to draw our milk on account of such roads. All are supporters of the Government, and this is the way we are used. I think it is time we changed our minds and try if they will do something. I might go one mile further up the river, right at our factory door. There we find what is called White's bridge sinking almost into the river. Here we want another new bridge on the hill straightened, not put in where the old one is. It ought to be raised up. Here is Mr. L. W. White's flour and lumber mill. Not five chains away up the stream. Such a bridge should be built high enough to let the mill's cows go up to the mills. By building in this way it would not only be a benefit to Mr. White, but would cut down such a bill for the public. Talking to a man on W. S. bridge I made some remarks to him about it being so low and what a benefit it would be to the public and Mr. White if it would be raised eight or ten feet. What do you suppose he said to me? "White is too big a Tory for us to benefit that much. Well, it is his opinion of such a man as that? Climax is big hill rather than benefit his fellow-man.
