NOTES AND COMMENT.

—During a Court dinner the Emperor
Francis Joseph remarked to a Hungarian
deputy that the South African war was one
of the most interesting on record. On
the one hand the good shooting and
organisation of the Boers were most sur-
prising; on the other, the numbers of
English that had fallen and had been
taken prisoners proved that the Britishers
had lost none of their dash and admir-
able pluck.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

London Empire: The French Govern-
ment hopes to make a profit of 20,000,000
francs from the forthcoming Paris Exhi-
bition, and will add this sum to the national
revenue in order to make up the deficit
created by undue extravagance. It is to
be hoped that the rabid nationalists will
cease to shout "La France aux Français!"
otherwise the Government's calculations
may be far from realized.

Army and Navy Gazette: "The loyal
of our Colonies cannot fail to produce y
a profound impression on all thinking
men throughout the civilized world. When
the British colonists come forward as they
have done, not only in finding men but
supplying money for their equipment and
maintenance, it is idle to say there is no
bond of sympathy and feeling between the
Mother Country and her dependencies
abroad. The colonies may exaggerate the
extent of our present difficulty, but their
spontaneous expressions of patriotism are
most healthy signs nevertheless, and will
do much to strengthen our position in the
eyes of Europe. The loyalty of the colo-
nials is now no mere idle talk, but a fac-
established beyond dispute."

To Cheer the Boys.

LONDON, Nov 24.—The War Office
issues the following letter from Lieut-Col.
the Right Hon. Sir Fleetwood Edwards,
keeper of Her Majesty's Privy Purse, to
the Marquis of Lansdowne, Secretary of
State for War:

"The Queen commands me to inform
you of her anxiety to make some little per-
sonal present as soon as possible to her
soldiers in South Africa. She has decided
on sending chocolate, which she has
been given to understand would be ap-
propriate and acceptable. It will be pack-
ed for each man in a tin especially desig-
ned for the occasion. The Queen hopes
you will be able to arrange for its convey-
ance and distribution."

A half pound of chocolates will be given
to each man. It will be suitable for eat-
ing or for making a beverage. One hun-
dred thousand tins have been ordered.

NEWS NOTES.

The Aldermen of De Moines, Iowa, have
followed up the "Curfew law" by an ordi-
nance forbidding all persons, without re-
gard to sex or standing in the community,
from walking on the streets after eleven
p. m., unless they can show clearly that
they are on legitimate errands. Other-
wise they must be thrown into gaol and
pay a fine not to exceed \$50 or go to gaol
for twenty days. Prohibiting spitting on
sidewalks or pavements, under penalty of
\$10 fine. However, citizens may spit in
the gutters or the streets. Prohibiting
swimming in the river without proper
clothes. Punishing persons who throw
banana peelings on the sidewalks or pav-
ements. Imposing a fine of \$5 to \$10 for
making loud noises or disturbances of any
kind. Prohibiting the operation of slot
machines or other gambling devices of any
kind. The bounds of individual freedom
are being narrowed in De Moines.
