Fine Concert Completes Major Festival Sessions

Their ears resounding to the continued applause of a packed house, contestants, accompanists, officials and association workers, packed up their music, instruments, documents and other paraphernalia Saturday night at Prince of Wales Auditorium, as the third curtain rang down on the third concert of the "Festival" concert which completed the major portion of Prince Edward Island's 12th annual Festival of Music. Dr. G. D. Steel former Principal of Prince of Wales College, presided at the concert.

Covering practically everything in the way of varied musical interpretations, the 29-number program displayed to the large audience the many and varied musical talents of P.E.I. residents in choral, vocal, and instrumental selections, plus a dash of Scottish flavour, supplied by the Burke family, and an early American dance, "The Cake Walk", performed by two young ladies from Kensington, the Misses Eleanor Champy and Elizabeth Davison. Included in the many choral groups appearing in Saturday night's Stars of the Festival concert were: The Charlottetown Chorus, the St. Vincent's Orphanage Boy's Choir, the Central Women's Club Chorus, the North Royalty Glee Club, the North Milton 4-H Club chorus, Queen Charlotte High Chorus, the Kirk of St. James Girls' Choir, Mt. Stewart School Chorus, Rochford Square School Girls' Choir and Notre Dame Academy Girl's Choir. In addition, the audience at P.W.C. were favored with selections by a number of individual artists.

AWARDS PRESENTED
At Saturday night's performance, awards were presented to each of the winning individual and group contestants that took part in the concert, by Mrs. W. J. Rodd, and Mrs. E. M. MacNeven, of the Association's Awards Committee. Winners in five classes at this year's festival, the Rochford Square School Choir was presented with five awards, reported to be the greatest number won by any single individual or group during this year's festival.

Over 2,000 contestants were entered in the 285 classes presented for adjudication. The greater part of the competitions were held within the city, where daily sessions were held at three centres: the auditoriums at Prince of Wales, Queen Charlotte High, and Notre Dame Academy. In addition, similar competitions in a number of classes were held at centres in Summerside and Montague, with final adjudication of these classes being completed in Charlottetown.

The president of the Music Festival Association, Professor Gordon Bennett of Prince of Wales College declared publicly on a number of occasions that this year the association were "particularly fortunate in their choice of adjudicators," noting that "an adjudicator can make or break a festival."
